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Changes Made In Local Real Estate Business

Dissolving a partnership of 23 years standing, the real estate and insurance firm of Kuratli & Wismer this week announced the retirement of H. A. Kuratli and the inclusion of Leon S. Davis. Later Howard Davis of Eugene will join the firm.

Commenting on the change H. A. Kuratli said his duties as justice of the peace of the Hillsboro district now required so much of his time that he could not longer efficiently serve his interests in the firm and therefore felt that he should devote his entire time to the justice of the peace activities. He will have his office in the rear of the present location.

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Established in 1905 by J. C. Kuratli, who was later joined by E. I. Kuratli, the firm is one of the oldest of its kind in Hillsboro. Following the purchase of an interest by J. J. Wismer in 1919, William Haase of Hillsboro bought the interests of J. C. Kuratli and the firm became known as Wismer & Haase. H. A. Kuratli purchased the Haase interest January 1, 1925, at the close of his service as county clerk.

Leon Davis, new member of the firm, is well known throughout Washington county and has been a lifelong resident of Beaverton and Hillsboro with the exception of a few years following World War I, when he was engaged in newspaper work in the middlewest while convalescing from injuries received in France during the war.

In recent years he has been a member of the staff of the Hillsboro Argus, secretary manager of the Hillsboro Chamber of Commerce, and manager of the Washington county fair. During the recent war he was in uniform again and served with the armed forces as a field director of the American Red Cross.

Howard Davis, a son, is a graduate of Hillsboro high school and Pacific university. He served during the recent war with the Marine Corps air wing and was discharged in the rank of captain. He saw active service in several of the major engagements of the Pacific theatre. Since his discharge he has been attending the University of Oregon. He expects to move to Hillsboro as soon as a suitable home can be found for him family.
