Nonhigh Levy Estimate \$1000

Total estimated tax levy for the nonhigh school district is \$1,000, according to the budget prepared Monday by the district board and budget committee. Estimated expenditures are \$10,200 and receipts were estimated at \$9,200 of which \$7,200 is from basic school support.

Expenditures are divided as follows: Tuition, \$7,450; transportation, \$1,050; clerical, legal, \$100; special education for students who cannot keep up with others and who need special attention, \$1,000; board expense and audit, \$300; and emergency, \$300.
