BUXTON-MANNING — William Edward Kelly, 70, passed away Sunday afternoon, January 4, at a Hillsboro hospital after an illness of five weeks.

He was born in Boone county, Iowa, February 24, 1872, and with his parents, the late George W. and Louisa A. Kelly, and two younger sisters left Iowa in April, 1879, crossing the plains with team and wagon, they arrived at Glencoe near North Plains and took up pioneer life on Pumpkin Ridge in the Arcadia district.

He married Grace Mead at Vancouver, Wash., May 29, 1903, and they lived a short time near Hillsboro. They then bought their present home and lived there continuously for over 41 years.

In addition to his wife, he is survived by four sons, Edward, Ellis, Lewis and Bill, all of the Mead district; two daughters, Mrs. Agnes French of Tillamook and Mrs. Evelyn Racine of Forest Grove, and 11 grandchildren.

Also surviving are three sisters, Mrs. Stella Ivory, Mrs. Edna Overgard and Mrs. Margaret Hurlbut, all of Portland, and one brother, Reuben J. Kelly of Buxton.

Funeral services will be held at the Forest Grove Undertaking company chapel Thursday (today) at 1:30 p. m., with Rev. Gordon Frazer of Hillsboro officiating. Interment will be at Banks cemetery.
