

## Norma Meyers Weds Pat McGraw At Church Rites

Centenary Wilbur Methodist church, Portland, was the scene of an impressive wedding ceremony Friday evening, December 26, at 8 o'clock, when Miss Norma Meyers, daughter of Mrs. L. A. Meyers of route 2, Hillsboro, became the bride of Howard A. (Pat) McGraw, son of Mr. and Mrs. H. E. McGraw of route 2, Forest Grove. Rev. Thomas Klink, pastor of Mt. Tabor Methodist church, Portland, performed the double ring ceremony before an altar with two candelabra with taper on either side, and two baskets of pink and white chrysanthemums with spikes of blue and rose.

Preceding the ceremony, Miss Barbara Fisher of Portland sang "Ave Maria," and "Through the Years." She also sang "L'Amour Toujours" at the reception. Miss Mary Lee McGraw, sister of the bridegroom, was bridesmaid. She wore blue chiffon similar to the maid of honor's dress with a blue halo headpiece, and carried a nosegay of pink chrysanthemums centered with blue iris.

Orville Jones, M.D., orthopedic specialist, conducted the clinic, assisted by Dr. H. M. Solte, medical director of the Washington-Yamhill district department.

Miss Corinn Pennington, Washington county health nurse, reports that a total of 34 children attended the clinic: 19 boys and 15 girls. Fifteen of the group were first time. Some children who are called in for rechecks are sometimes routed to the Doernbecher hospital.

This clinic was not the largest held here. Peak years were 1936, 42 children; 1946, 41; 1947, 47.
