

Many Vacancies Exist for Aviation Cadets; Applications to Be Speeded

The United States Air Force has greatly increased the size of the March class of its Aviation Cadet program and a number of vacancies exist at the present time. M. Sgt. Harry Mehrens, sergeant in charge of the Forest Grove recruiting station, reported Tuesday. Measures have been taken to hurry the processing of applicants in order to meet the quota for the class, he added.

Plans have been made to give the required mental examination in Portland whenever a sufficient number of men have made application and to fly those who qualify to McChord Field, Washington, for their physical examinations.

Anyone interested who meets the following qualifications may receive the information they want at the army recruiting office in the American Legion building at Forest Grove any afternoon, Monday through Friday, between the hours of 2 and 5, or at the post office in Hillsboro any Tuesday between 11 and 12 a. m.

To qualify for this training a man must be between the ages of 20 and 23, unmarried, of excellent character and physical condition, and have completed at least one-half of the credits leading to a degree at a recognized college or university or pass an equivalent mental examination.

Men who meet these requirements and make application will be given 32 weeks of training, then be commissioned as second lieutenants in the officers' reserve corps and will be assigned to duty with the U. S. Air Force. After completing the training from civilian life and fail to finish will be given the opportunity of either returning to civilian life or of completing a three-year tour of duty with the air force.

Time Extended For Veterans

Oregon veterans now have until July 31 to restate their G. I. insurance without a physical examination, following a new extension of his deadline from last December 31. Tom Craig, Veterans Administration contact representative in Hillsboro, reported today.

During the past 11 months, 13,179 ex-GI's of this state have received \$39,443,500 worth of National Service Life insurance, Craig said. Large as this may seem, veterans in Washington more than doubled Oregon's mark, as 27,000 reinstated \$184,000,000 of coverage.

Veterans whose health is as good as when their G. I. insurances lapsed may rejoin it with no more trouble than an application and paying two months' premium. Even those who didn't carry a twice policies when they were in uniform can get them now.
