'Spartan Hoop Quintet Edges Vikings, 38-37

Hilli and Forest Grove waged one of those slug-fest battles so often seen between traditional rivals when they met Tuesday night on the Viking floor. Lanky Hilhi forwards put the Spartans on top with a field goal in the last moments of play, 38 to 37, in true Frank Merriwell style.

The Spartans trailed Forest Grove through a large part of the first half, being behind at half, 16 to 11. The Vikings were ahead 26 to 22 going into the last period of the bitterly fought tilt.

It was first sports meeting of the two schools since last spring. Forward Bobby Frantz took scoring honors in the tilt by a wide margin, connecting for six field goals and adding eight free throws for a total of 20 points. Forest Grove was high for the losers with 11 points.

Forest Grove had an edge from the free throw line, sinking 13 out of 24. Hillsboro had 10 out of 28.

Hilli, Vikings Renew Grid Feud At Earlier Date

Hilli and Forest Grove are scheduled to resume their long-time football rivalry this fall but the coffee in future years very probably will be at a regular date on the Tualatin-Yamhill Valley League schedule rather than the late Thanksgiving date.

T. V. V. league officials at their Monday night meeting near Tillamook approved a 1948 grid schedule which brings Forest Grove and Hilhi together on November 15. Because of the annual state championship play-offs being in session in the latter part of November, officials decided to quit the Thanksgiving-Hilli-Forest Grove date to give both schools a chance to shoot for state honors.

The league adopted schedules for spring sports and decided to underwrite the expense for an annual music festival and Girls' Play Day, the former at Newberg and the latter at McMinnville. It was decided to place each school in charge of one event for the Play Day. Each school is to furnish a choir for the music festival.

GI Home Loans Show Increase, VA Announces

Large jump in construction of new homes with the aid of GI loans is in prospect for 1948 in Oregon, Thomas M. Craig, veterans administration contact representative in this area, said today.

During December, the VA's regional office in Portland received five times as many applications for loan guarantees on dwellings yet to be built as in any prior month of the year, Craig explained.

Although FHA has resumed its Title VI program, the VA expects the GI loan business of the state's lending firms to show a sustained increase over last year, he added.

During 1947, the VA approved 4750 GI loans for Oregon veterans more than four out of every five on old or new homes. These approvals totaled \$24,976,997, including federal guarantees amounting to 49 per cent.

Extensive prices and building costs caused a drop in loans from 1946 to 1947. The average loan was for \$5536 to a home, \$4567 on a farm and \$3942 on a business.

Prospects are tremendous, Craig commented. "Less than one out of 13 ex-GI in Oregon has applied as yet for this benefit, and the VA loan program has nine more years to run."

Craig meets with veterans each Thursday morning in the city hall at Hillsboro.

Kitchen Cabinets Covered in Book

A comprehensive 90-page illustrated bulletin on planning kitchen cabinets has just been issued by the Oregon State college experiment station as bulletin No. 445. It is the report of research conducted by Maud Wilson, home economist in charge and nationally known specialist in housing.

This bulletin is the first of two publications dealing with planning kitchen cabinets, the second being "Patterns for Kitchen Cabinets," to be issued soon. The two are designed by home craftsmen, teachers of courses in house planning, and designers of factory-built cabinets for use by homemakers in preparing kitchens for new or remodeled kitchens.

The modern kitchen is organized on the work center principle as nearly as space and cost limitations permit, Miss Wilson states. When properly planned the work surfaces will be adequate, with equipment and supplies stored within an easy reach.

Three steps are suggested by Miss Wilson for keeping the cost of a modern kitchen within reason while providing adequate cabinet space. These follow:

1. Plan counter space to provide the minimum adequate amount of work space needed at each center.
2. Utilize the available storage space above and below each surface.
3. Provide for the remaining storage needs with floor-to-ceiling cabinets.

One section of the bulletin is devoted to heights of working surfaces as found most convenient for the average woman. A list of recommended dimensions and heights for kitchen surfaces are given.

Another suggestion by Miss Wilson is that every kitchen should have a place for the workers to sit at work with feet on the floor. This may be a pull-out board set just high enough to clear the thighs—24 to 26 inches.

Copies of the bulletin may be obtained free from county extension offices or direct from the college.

Food Meeting Attracts Many

Attendance at the second of a series of foodhandlers' courses has increased as much as 250 per cent at Hillsboro, almost 100 per cent at Forest Grove, and over 50 per cent at Beaverton, over the first series given, according to Sanitarian T. W. Christiansen.

The courses are conducted by the Washington county health department in cooperation with the state board of health. They are primarily given for operators, managers and employees of all eating and drinking establishments.

The speakers in this series were Dr. H. M. Stoltz, health officer for the Yamhill-Washington health district; Dr. William Levin, director of the state board of health hygiene laboratory; and E. J. Simmons, professor of bacteriology, Oregon State college.

In this course emphasis was given to the ultimate control of harmful bacteria. "Germs Take Pot-luck," a film strip, was also shown. Certificates for attendance will be issued whenever anyone has attended four times.

Mrs. Annie Larson Passes in Portland
