Mrs. Max Bennett of Coos Bay, financial secretary, reported a large increase in membership. Dayton Prairie Social club and the Rockaway Women's Civic club were accepted for membership. The Coos Bay Women's Civic club, formerly the Marshfield Women's Civic club, re-instated with a membership of 33. The Oregon state convention was set for September 1 and 2 with tentative plans to be held in Coos Bay.
