GOP Would Cut Taxes

The Republican high command in the House Tuesday approved a \$5,300,000,000 income tax cut, refusing to turn back the Knutson bill in an effort to pick up Democratic votes to override an expected presidential veto.

Russia Makes Demand

Russia formally demanded dissolution of the joint British-American economic administration of the two western zones in the allied control council in Berlin Tuesday, declaring the arrangement violated Potsdam agreements.

Less Gas Use Asked

The government Thursday called on the public to reduce consumption of scarce gasoline, fuel oil and gas by 15 per cent as a new cold wave rolled across the northern plains toward the eastern seaboard already shivering in a below zero weather.

Aid Critics Hit

Secretary of State Marshall said Thursday night he feared "radical alteration" of his multi-billion dollar foreign aid program would endanger its chances of preventing European collapse.

Ex-Navy Secretary Dies

Joseph Daniels, last member of Woodrow Wilson's World War I cabinet, died at Raleigh, N. C., January 13. He was secretary of the navy during World War I.

Akers T. Ross Dies in Aloha

Akers T. Ross, 69, widely known throughout the Aloha area as a great lover of roses, died suddenly Sunday in his home at route 1, Aloha.

He was born in Virginia in 1879 and had retired several years ago. He served most of his life as records clerk for the Spokane, Portland & Seattle Railroad company.

Supply of Small Seeds Adequate To Meet Needs

The supply of small seeds for pasture and hay crops that are so important in the conservation program is enough to supply the need of farmers in this country, the U. S. department of agriculture production summary indicates.

Red Clover production, at 1,194,800 bushels, is a little more than 8 per cent of normal. Both yield and acreage were a little below average. Alsike clover seed production of 366,200 bushels is a little above normal. The alfalfa seed crop indicated at 1,999,400 bushels, at most 50 per cent more than the average.

Above average yields and a one-fourth greater acreage account for the large seed crop. The leaved-seed crop, so important in the South, is just about average with production of 153,900,000 pounds. The 564,400 bushels of sweet clover seed produced this year is about 6 per cent of average. The timothy seed crop, so important as a companion of red clover, is somewhat above average with a total of 1,641,400 bushels.

The 15,900,000 pounds of red fescue seed is somewhat below average. Sudan grass, important annual pasture and hay crop in the Great Plains and other warm sections of the country, is less than half of average with a production of 20,740,000 pounds.
