## First Citizen Selection

Selection of a citizen of the year, sponsored for Hillsboro for the first time by this newspaper, marks an effort to honor those among us who have given and are giving outstanding service to the community. Far too often we wait until after a person is gone before bestowing deserved bouquets.

The first award of this kind will be presented at an all-community testimonial dinner at the Peter Boscoe school cafeteria tonight. And it is entirely fitting that it be an all-community affair because the activities for which the first citizen and other nominees are being honored are in the interest of their fellow citizens and are a definite contribution toward making Hillsboro a better place in which to live, to do business and to work. Many different types of community service are represented by the 17 men and six women nominees. Undoubtedly others might very well have been nominated for their activities in different fields.

Every effort has been made by the sponsors of this initial first citizen selection to insure absolute fairness and we hope that this has been achieved. Members of the selection committee are key people in the community and are truly representative of the various groups. The chairman of the committee was a non-voting member.

If the project is successful and if in some small measure it gives a stimulus to the many different fields of service so important to the well being of the community and its people, the publishers and staff members of the Argus will feel that their efforts have been justified and that the award should be continued as an annual affair.

## Makes Better Place to Live

Approval by the voters of Hillsboro school district No. 7 by an overwhelming vote of the additional bond issue offers plenty of proof that people of this area want the best in educational facilities for their youngsters and are willing to pay for them. The vote enables the district to proceed with the complete program, thus for the first time the community will have a complete elementary school plant with well-rounded physical education facilities.

Completion of the grade school building program will mark a new era in the life of this community and will be an important factor in making Hillsboro an even better place in which to live.

She was taken to Duernbecher and Shrine hospitals in Portland and the Sister Kenny treatment was applied. Donna now walks without the aid of crutches, leg braces, or canes and goes to the hospital once a week for further exercises. This was made possible by the "March of Dimes" and at no cost to her parents. For such a worthy cause it is always best to give all you can, for polio strikes where least expected.

Johnny is a partner in the French grocery out Main street with W. S. French. He was junior of Hills for about six years prior to his new business. The Eckerts also have an 11-year-old son, Dennis Dean.

Don't suppose anyone ever thought to ask who farmed Birchwood park grounds prior to its becoming a housing project. Well, Harry Reed did it, and he also farmed corn where Hills now stands. And down on Main street where the TV Cor stands he farmed peas and other vegetables for the cannery. ## Public Forum Says Move Unfair

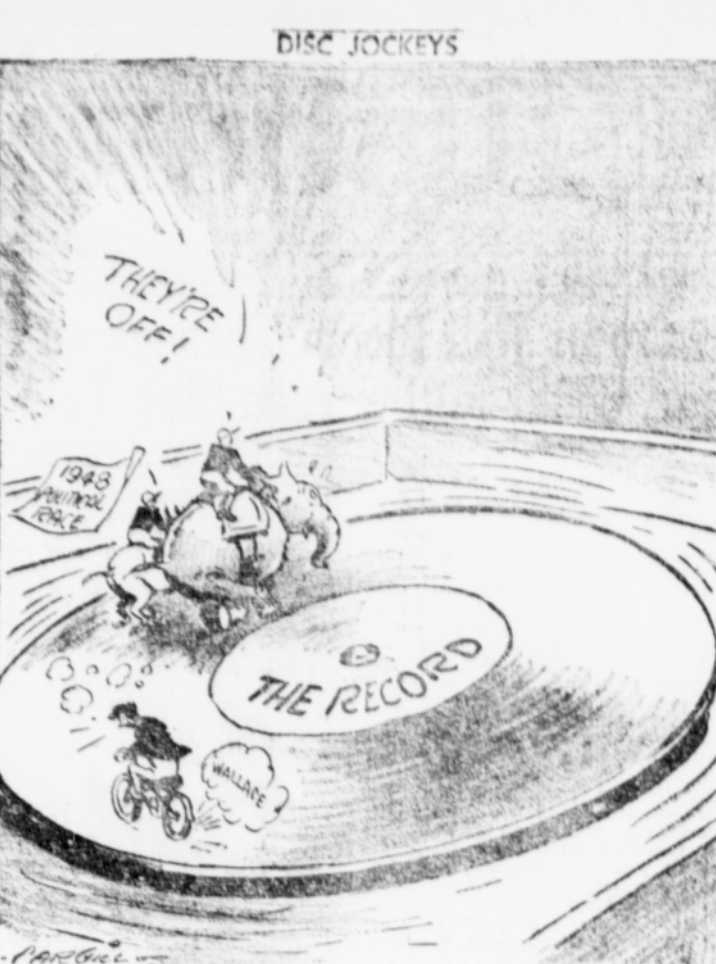
Editor of Argus:

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## Scientific Painting Program Laid Out For Use of Color

A scientific study of color has led to the development of a program for the use of color in painting for schools, industry, and institutions, reports Miss Dorothy Newton, assistant home demonstration agent for Washington county.

In schools the psychological effect of color was most striking, she said. Color proved a factor in molding attitudes and behavior patterns. She listed the following as important in planning a school paint program to provide a cheer-

ful inviting environment: To conserve weight, to improve posture by providing the best seeing conditions for clear vision and eye comfort, and to supplement light with light-reflecting surfaces having a minimum glare.

Scientific tests show that light colors have various degrees of light reflection, she added. White reflects more light than any other color, 80 per cent or more; light colors provide 50-60 per cent reflection, while medium tones have 30 to 40 per cent.

Tests show that men and women prefer different colors. Women prefer warm tones of rose and peach. Men largely select blue.
