Johnson has been a practicing lawyer for more than 20 years and a government clerk and law enforcement official for more than 10. During the war he was president of the Sken Electric Works. He served as a member of the state legislature at three regular and one special session.

Johnson is a member of various civic and fraternal organizations, including veterans organizations, the Grand, Lions club, and he is also a member of the rotary club.

Deputy Sheriff's File—Last week also saw the filing of two members of Sheriff John W. Connelly's office for nomination as sheriff. Chief Deputy Sheriff Dick Bush and Deputy Sheriff Halie Ireland are seeking the position which Connelly will leave this year.

In a statement announcing his decision to seek the nomination for re-election, Senator Patterson said: "I enjoyed working in the legislature as a senator from this county. I would like to continue in the work for another term.
