

## Silver Anniversary Observed by Clubs

Silver anniversary of the Washington County Federation of Women's clubs was celebrated at the Hillsboro Congregational church Friday with an all day meeting.

Mrs. J. M. Stretcher, president, conducted the meeting.

The program opened with the club collected led by Mrs. Stretcher; salute to the flag led by Mrs. Elwood Johnson; and prayer by Mrs. D. E. Nourse.

It was decided that the clubs continue the Music Scholarship fund and the method of raising the money was left to music chairmen of the clubs.

This fund is to be known as the Ruth Chandler music fund, it being started during her term as State Federation music chairman, and will be awarded annually to a music student at Pacific university.

Mrs. Stretcher gave history of the club for the past 25 years, and read a list of deceased members, whose memory was honored by silent prayer.

Highlighting the morning session was introduction of Mrs. W. B. Chandler of Hillsboro, state president, and past presidents of the County Federation, headed by Mrs. T. W. Hyde of Astoria who organized the county group and was its first president.

Mrs. Hyde was president of the Hillsboro Coffee club at the time, 1923, and served three years as county president. Mrs. Earl Hobbs, a member of the Cornelius Women's club at the time, was elected in 1926.

Mrs. Virgil Meyer, at that time a member of the Hiteon club, was elected in 1934. Mrs. Alice Connell of Hillsboro Coffee club, elected in 1938, and Mrs. Ann Conklin of Metzger club, elected in 1938, held office until 1942, when Mrs. J. M. Stretcher, member of the Scholls club, was elected and is president of the county federation at this time.

Following Mrs. Hobbs, three other presidents served, but were unable to attend the celebration Friday. They were Mrs. J. C. Leedy, Sherwood; Mrs. Mary Roberts of Forest Grove club, both in California; Mrs. J. A. B. Smith, a member of the Metzger club at that time.

Other guests honored were Mrs. Ada Patterson, president of the Hillsboro Coffee club, and Mrs. Emma McKinney, a past president of the Coffee club and county publicity chairman.

Honor guests were presented with corsages of silvered greenery, centered with a flower, a gift of the county executive committee.

All honored guests gave a short resume of their tenure in office. Mrs. Hyde, who had lost all her early records by fire, reminisced on the early days of the county federation and wonderful growth women's clubs had made here in the 25 years.

She spoke enthusiastically about the reports of activities of the clubs and said she was glad to see how the rural clubs were growing and the work they were doing.

Mrs. Hobbs told of the time women's clubs tried to have an allowance put in the county budget to provide for a county nurse. She said after being promised a large delegation, only three women attended. She was the spokesman for the trio, and said the men would scarcely listen to her, so the first attempt for a county nurse was lost.

However, through perseverance by women's groups, the county now has three nurses and a part time physician, but needs more. The ideal set-up for the county now should be eight nurses, according to population.

Mrs. W. B. Chandler, president of the Oregon Federation, introduced members of her executive committee present. Mrs. Emory Ingham of Portland, chairman of Junior Women's clubs; Mrs. W. C. Giersbach of Forest Grove, American Home chairman; Mrs. F. Abernethy, Hillsboro, Youth Conservation chairman; and Mrs. Zola Morgan, Hillsboro, corresponding secretary.

Mrs. Chandler has asked each Oregon club member to memorize before the national convention meets in Portland.

The nominating committee's report was read by Mrs. L. W. Guild of the Scholls club, and officers will be elected at the April meeting, which will be president's day.

The meeting closed with singing "Blest Be the Tie That Binds." Among the songs sung during the day was "Oregon, My Oregon," which Mrs. Chandler has asked each Oregon club member to memorize before the national convention meets in Portland.
