Commie Tricks Cited in Book

By their own estimates there are nearly 1,000,000 Communist Party members and ardent Communist sympathizers in the United States, many of them in vital key positions in our economy, who stand ready to obey orders of the Kremlin to undermine the security of the United States.

This charge was made in the foreword of a new book, "Is This Tomorrow?" which declares:

"Today there are approximately 85,000 official members of the Communist Party in the United States. Communists themselves claim that for every official party member there are ten others ready, willing and able to do the Party's bidding."

Published in comic book form, "Is This Tomorrow?" graphically portrays the means through which

Communists seize power.

Communist techniques, such as the use of "front" organizations, well-buttered dupes, and operating behind innocent-sounding names, class hatred, the use of Communist key men in labor organizations, a mass of trained propagandists, and the utilization of national crises to seize power in the name of the people are pictured and described.

While the events described in "Is This Tomorrow?" are fanciful so far as the United States is concerned, every one of them has actually transpired in other countries in which the Communists have seized control, according to the book.

Incensed at the picture of Communist activities in the United States in the book, the Daily Worker, the Communist party newspaper, has launched five attacks on it in its pages.

"Is This Tomorrow?" is published for one purpose: "to make you think," the foreword in the book declares. "To make you more alert to the menace of Communism."

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
