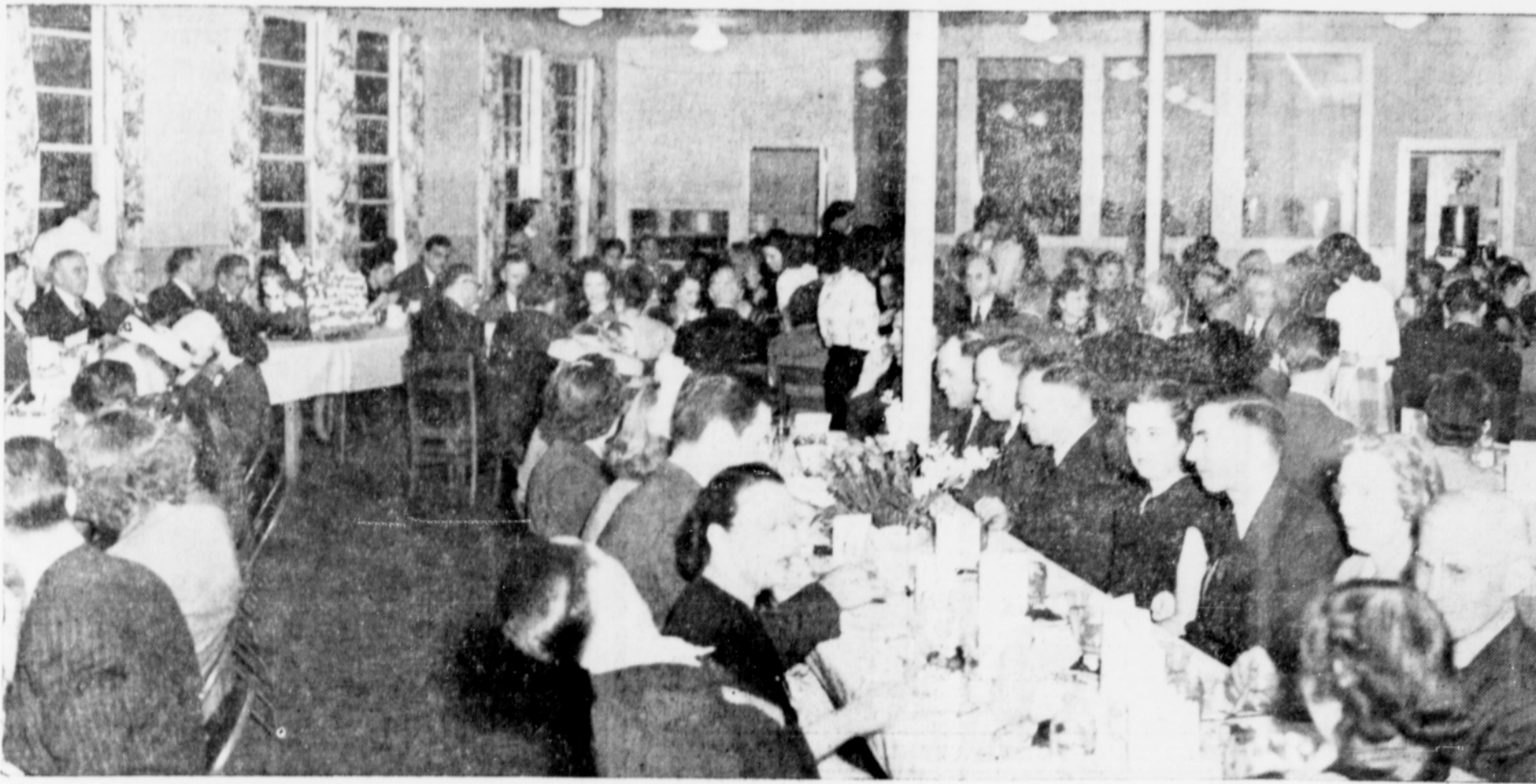

Ireland, Hagg Named Leaders Of Dairy Co-op

A major expansion in its recently organized retail activities is planned by the Dairy Co-operative association, according to a report made by manager Will W. Henry at the annual membership meeting in Portland Tuesday.

Arthur Ireland of near Forest Grove was re-elected president and Henry Hagg of Redview vice-president. Hay Holson of Amity and Grant L. Johnson of Wainwright, Wash., were re-elected directors.

It was pointed out by Henry that recent public milk hearings revealed that Dairy Co-op members furnish about 60 per cent of the milk reaching the market daily. Until recently the association's Portland activities were in the wholesale field only.

In recent months the Co-op entered the Portland retail field by taking over the business of four distributors. It also has added the production of butter, cheese, ice cream and cottage cheese and has set up its own retail bottling plant.

Henry told members that the association plans "to expand further and develop retail milk distribution and expand the ice cream business in Portland. We are planning to set up a much greater volume and may install in our powder plant a much larger milk processing and bottling department. As we develop volume we will need more capacity."

We may put up milk distributing plants in several other Portland area communities to provide better service to those areas.

Henry reported that expansions as including erection of an a grade receiving station at Hillsboro, erection of a garage and feed warehouse at Salem, an addition to the Portland garage, erection of a combination milk distribution depot and fountain store at Hillsboro, erection of a milk distribution depot at Oregon City, merger with the Co-op of the Umatilla County Creamery association and its manufacturing plant at Hermiston.

Thumbnail Sketch Of City Conditions

there is little left for expansion of the distribution system, which now totals 23.39 miles. Transmission mains are now 28.29 miles, of which seven miles is 12-inch wood pipe and the rest 18-inch pipe.

Shute Park—Considerable improvement shown in park facilities during the past year, including installation of public rest rooms at the ball park, building of permanent benches and tables in Shute Park and purchase of approximately 60 park benches. A full-time caretaker has been employed since early last spring and general appearance of the park has shown considerable improvement since that time. Skat-

ing operation has produced a net revenue of \$2,475.82, and the Firemen turned over \$1,628.03 from the "Happy Days" celebration. Walks around the park, lighting and parking facilities should be given consideration as soon as financing can be arranged.

Airport—Considerable growth in facilities, four large hangars, each over 5,000 square feet in area, being constructed under a 15-year lease agreement. Receipts for the fiscal year 1946-47 were \$5,962.89. Maintenance and betterment expenditure was \$5,338.83. The project in co-operation with the federal government to extend city water service to the airport was abandoned because of the federal requirement that approach zones to all runways be cleared of obstructions prior to the expenditure of

federal funds on the water project. Operators now using well water but it is recommended that water service to the port be extended soon as possible because of fire protection.

Sewer System—Very little change made during the last year. Fifty-nine new connections were made, 52 of them residential, making a total of 1444 sewer connections. Disposal of industrial waste made by irrigation with satisfactory results. Trouble again with back water from sewer mains due to unimproved condition of many streets. During the heaviest part of the season approximately 650,000 gallons disposed of. Planting consisted of 3.3 acres of beans, 10 acres of pumpkins, approximately 20 acres of sweet corn and some barley. Gross receipts were \$5,613.21 and cost of farming

operation \$4,541.45.

Street Department—City street system consists of a total of 31.5 miles, 18.4 paved, 4.3 oiled macadam, 6.7 crushed rock or gravel macadam, and 2.1 unpaved. The following is estimated cost for bringing the city street system up to a reasonable standard: Widening existing paved streets, including curbs, 13 miles, \$390,000; new construction, pavement and curbs, 6.72 miles, \$302,400; new construction, oiled surfaces and curbs, 6.46 miles, \$226,100; new construction, sidewalk, concrete, 16.72 miles, \$133,790.

City of Hillsboro finances are in excellent condition on the basis of its annual audit for the 1946-47 fiscal year with only \$20,000 outstanding in general obligation bonds and one-half of this amount provided for in the new budget as a sinking fund. City Manager J. W. Barney revealed in his annual report to the city council Tuesday night.

The present cheerful outlook could change rather fast in these inflationary times, however, Barney reported, if a recession should set in because operating costs might for a time increase while revenues dropped.

He pointed out that of the \$53,010 budgeted for all purposes in the 1947-48 general fund budget only \$38,142.31 was raised by taxes and \$36,867.69 comes from sources other

than taxes. Of the \$38,142.31 raised by taxes, \$14,350 was for debt service and \$23,792.31 for current operating expenses. Under present laws the six per cent increase can be applied only to the latter figure, which would permit an increase of only approximately \$1,400.

Figure Not Sufficient
The city manager said this figure "is not sufficient to meet the rapidly increasing cost of government operations."

Of the \$20,000 outstanding in general obligation bonds only half is left to be raised by future levies, the other half being provided in the 1947-48 budget as a sinking fund.

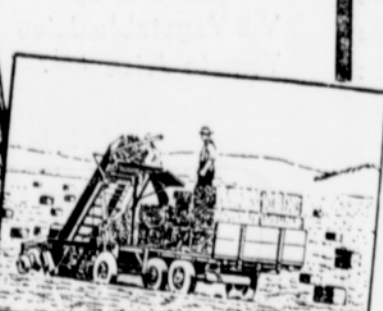

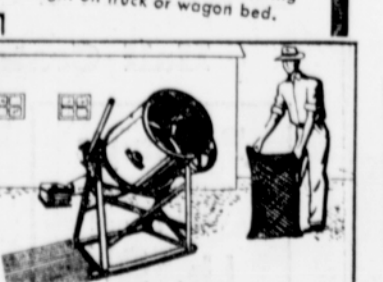

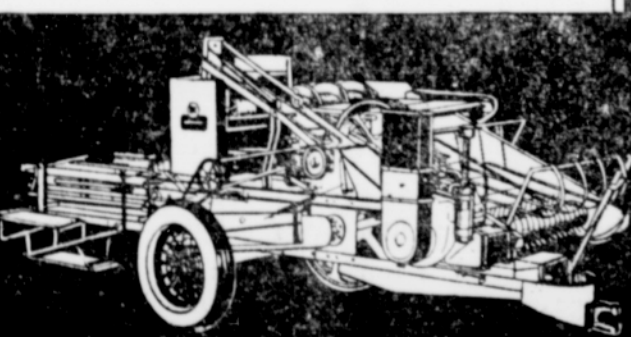
