Evening Classes Opening at Pacific

Registration for adult evening classes in business at Pacific university are now being accepted at the university registrar's office. It was announced here by William L. Bricker, head of the department of business administration and economics. Classes were started this month.

Eligible veterans may enroll for extension classes under the GI bill. Bricker pointed out, adding that several veterans have been in attendance in the fall session, particularly in the accounting and bookkeeping classes.

Regular day classes in business subjects available to extension students include business English, cost accounting, marketing, selling and advertising, introduction to business, mathematics of finance and business law.

Adults' shorthand classes will be taught by Earl Dvorak, former Columbia university faculty member and now head of secretarial science work at Pacific. Bricker will teach classes in typing and bookkeeping.

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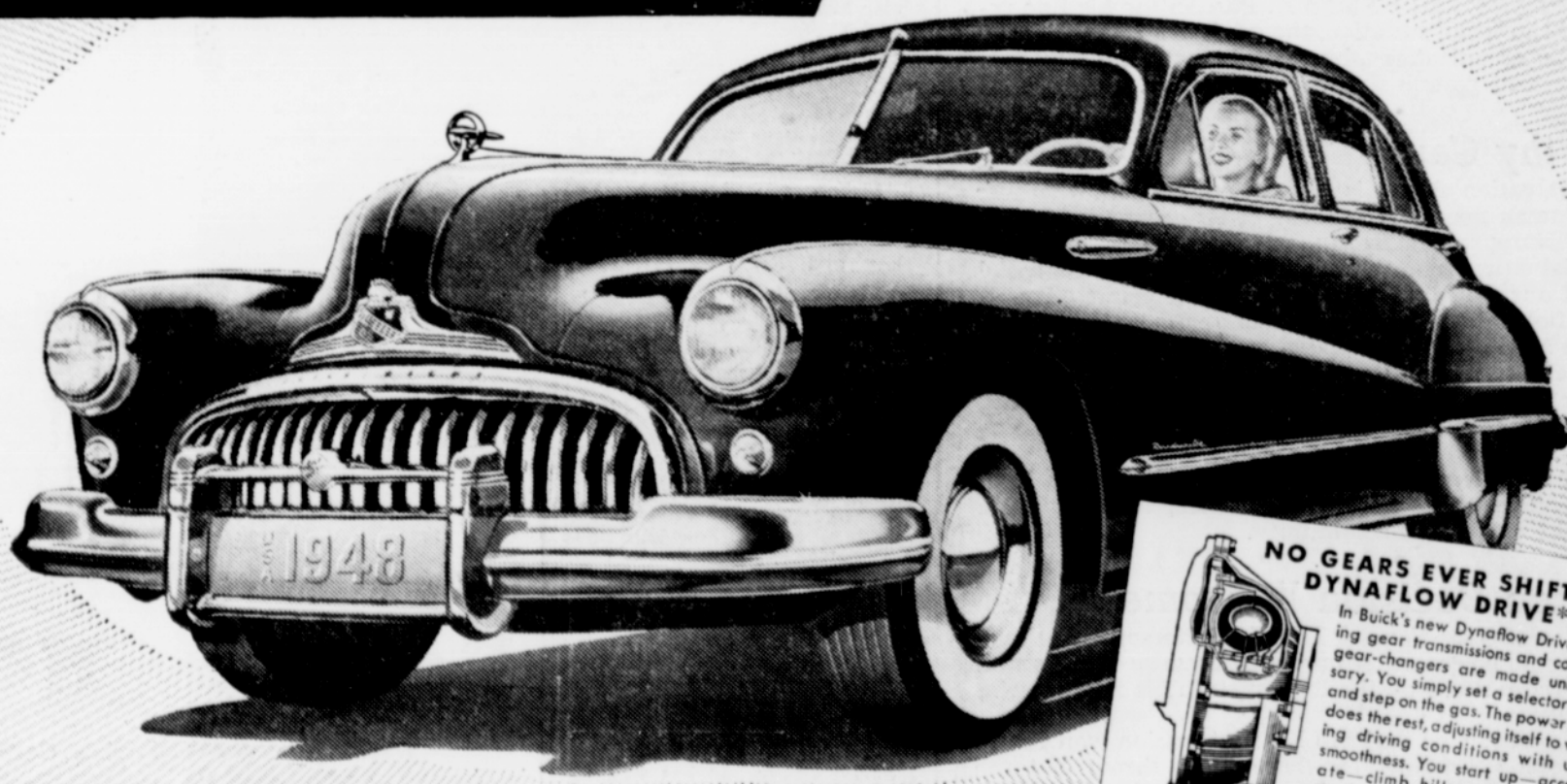
