Honorary Membership Maternity Club Given by Reedville Man to Aloha Baby

Baby Carole Elaine Peterson, infant daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Peterson of Aloha, Saturday became the eighth and youngest honorary member of the Maternity Brothers club in Portland.

The club, formed 25 years ago by two men whose birthdays were February 7, took in Carole Elaine as the first baby born in Portland on February 7. She was born at Emanuel hospital when the day was just 54 minutes old.

In addition to receiving an honorary membership in the club, she was presented with a layette, a custom which the club has followed since 1940. She weighed 7 pounds 11 ounces at birth. Her

father is a shipping clerk for the Sperry Flour company.

Following the eight-year custom, the birthday club appeared at the hospital Saturday morning and with the usual formality presented Mrs. Peterson with the gift and membership. The ceremony was broadcast.

Following the presentation the club held a luncheon meeting at the Aero club. Special guests included members who were inducted in the last seven years.

The club was formed 25 years ago when Clarence D. Porter, whose home is now at Reedville, and Roy Burnett of Portland got together to celebrate their birthdays. The club

continued to grow and received newspaper fame in 1940 when the practice of presenting a layette to the first baby born in the city on February 7 started.

A native son of Washington county, Porter is past president of the Portland Rose society, past prime minister of Royal Rosarians, past director of the Portland Rose Festival association, trustee of St. Helen's hall and junior college trustee of the Davenport fund and active member of the Portland Chamber of Commerce.

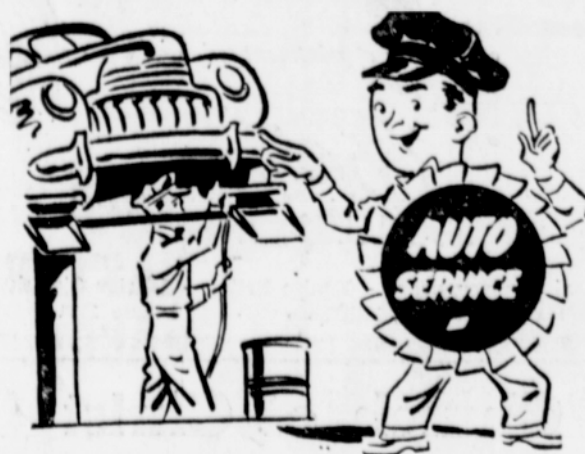
Two Shows Set
