

Engineer Lists Changes in Local Flood Control Plan

Several changes in proposed plans for the Tualatin valley flood control project were announced Monday by Tigard by Col. O. E. Walsh, chief of the Portland district army engineers. He made the announcement at a meeting of the Tualatin Protective association last week.

Original plans called for elimination of all trees, brush, logs and debris on the Tualatin river bank for 50 feet on either side and that the river be lined with concrete for 25 miles.

New plans, however, call for leaving trees untouched and for lining the river for just 16 miles, he said. No liner is contemplated for the river from a point four miles above Roamer's Rest to the Oregon Iron & Steel company dam near Willamette.

Flood control by a series of reservoirs on the upper stretches of the river was termed uneconomical by the engineer. A flood control project only by channel clearing and straightening and removing material would not be economically justifiable without addition of a drainage project, he added.

A reclamation bureau suggestion that three dams might solve the flood control problem was also branded as uneconomical by Col. Walsh. He said the "minimum plan" for replacing the present dam at Willamette clearing the channel and eliminating some of the oxbows also was uneconomical.

Total cost of the project was estimated at \$26,000,000, with channel work to cost about \$17,000,000 and the drainage portion about \$9,000,000. He said property owners above Roamer's Rest will reap about 95 per cent of the benefits from the project so should pay a proportionate share of the local cost. The

federal government will contribute about \$13,710,000, he said. The plans are to be submitted to the army engineers in Washington, D. C., about March 1.

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Stassen to Speak At Press Meeting

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene—Coming to Oregon to be the principal speaker at the banquet of the 29th annual Oregon Press Conference sponsored by the University of Oregon school of journalism and the Oregon Newspaper Publishers association, Harold E. Stassen expects to visit and speak in 14 Oregon cities during a five day stay.

Thousands of Oregonians will have an opportunity to hear the former Minnesota governor and a leading contender for the Republican presidential nomination.

Stassen expects, in this pre-convention tour of the Pacific coast via airplane, to arrive in Salem at 9 a. m. Friday, February 20. He will address the Willamette University student body and Salem townspeople at 11 a. m., be in Stayton at 1 p. m., Seaside at 1:45 p. m., Lebanon at 2:35 p. m., Sweet Home at 3:30 p. m. and arrive in Eugene in time

for the 6:30 banquet. At the press conference banquet, Mr. Stassen will speak on "The Struggle for Freedom."

He will leave Eugene early Saturday morning, arriving in Redmond at 11 a. m. At noon he will speak at the Deschutes County Republican committee luncheon in Bend and then return to Eugene, where he will address the student body of the University of Oregon and townspeople, in a talk sponsored by the university educational activities board, at 7:30 p. m. in McArthur Court.

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
