

Beaverton City Council Appoints Manager, Mayor

The Beaverton city council, sitting in special session, February 13 adopted the city manager form of municipal government, accepting the resignation of its old mayor and appointing a new mayor, a city manager and a new councilman.

Appointed mayor by the councilmen was Paul Knapp, who succeeds J. V. Chandler. Chandler's resignation had been pending since January 1. He expects to move to Tigard soon.

Maurice M. Romig, former Hillsboro school teacher, was named the city's first city manager. Bruce McMahon, young realtor, was appointed councilman to fill the vacancy left by Carl Ramussen, who resigned because of the press of private business.

Both the city manager and new mayor announced plans to reorganize the city government. They said administration would be streamlined to deal with the problems that face Beaverton and that

the procedure of holding council meetings would be streamlined.

Another matter which is expected to be brought up soon for official consideration, Romig said, is Beaverton's sewer bond issue. The study will begin, he said, as soon as the citizens' committee report is ready.

Romig has lived in Beaverton for the past two-and-a-half years, engaged in construction, design and cabinet work. He was employed in the hull engineering department, Oregon Shipyards, for two and one-half years prior to that time.

He had spent 14 years as shop work and mechanical drawing instructor in Hillsboro and Portland high schools, spending his summers in small contracting and construction. Since July 1 he has served as a member of the board of directors, school district 48. He graduated from Oregon State college in 1929 as an industrial arts engineer.

The chapter hopes in the future to use the Eugene school as a center and establish feeder units elsewhere in the state.

Another major undertaking was the Craft Shop for the Handicapped in downtown Portland. Here handicapped persons may sell their wares and reap the benefits of full profit, because the store is a non-profit venture. It affords the handicapped with an outlet to the general public for their goods.

A Washington county organization is being set up. Its main purpose will be to recommend problems of the county to the state board of directors. These will be studied and necessary steps taken.
