

Speaker Urges Swimming Pool For Community

Promotion and planning of a community swimming pool is not an easy job but it is a vital one, according to the speaker at the Red Cross drive committee meeting at the All Saints Episcopal church last night.

Evans recommended construction of a year-around pool in preference to an outdoor pool which would be used only a few months. He said the cost would be only 25 per cent more and this could be cut down if the pool were built adjacent to a school gym where locker room and shower facilities could be shared. He said the logical time to learn to swim is in grade school.

It was pointed out that a pool can have five major uses: teaching under an organized educational plan; remedial, for use by the physically handicapped; physical reconditioner, for persons of all ages; recreational, both for swimmers and for spectators; competitive, providing for sports meets.

Evans said the nation had 14,000 drownings annually 32 years ago when the Red Cross started its work in swimming safety. That total has been cut in half despite the fact that 30 times as many persons are now swimming. He said the Red Cross would stand ready to assist with planning of a local pool and will submit free of charge plans for construction of one.

James Hickman, deputy state fire marshal for this area, presented a movie of fires in the Portland region and urged backing of the movement to improve present facilities. He was introduced by Larry Sisson. Keith Wilcox introduced Mr. Evans. President Lynn Selfridge presided over the meeting.

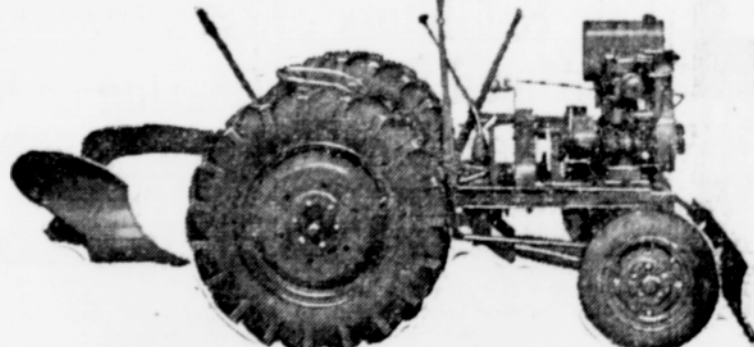
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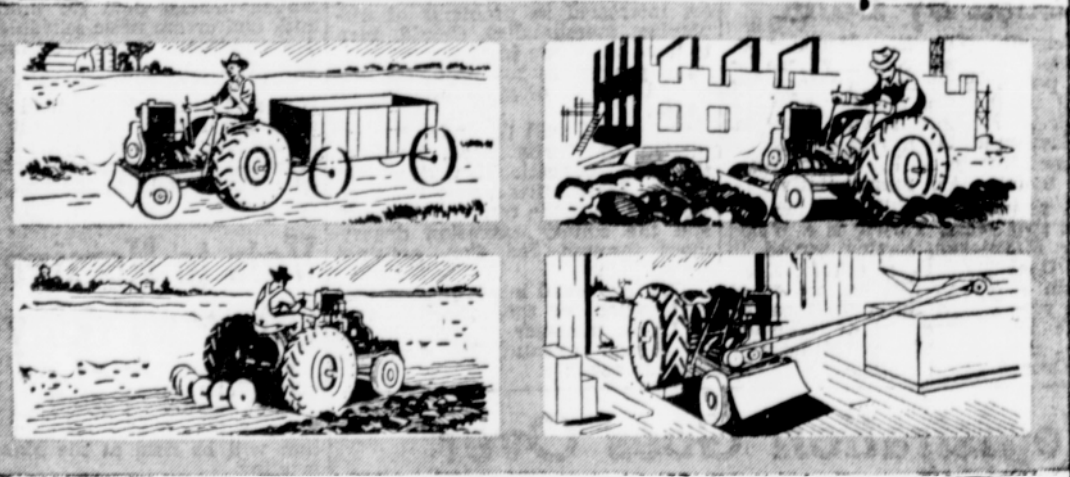
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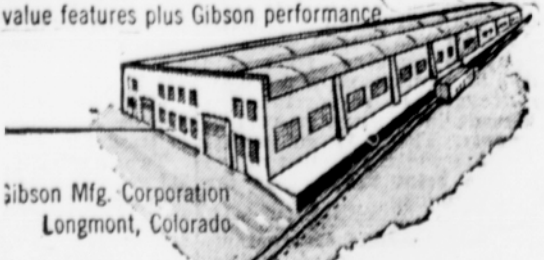
