Truths of Religion Must Be Observed, Speaker States

If we let the great fundamental truths of our religion lapse, totalitarianism will take over, Rev. Steen Whiteside of All Saints Episcopal church told Hillsboro listeners at their Wednesday noon luncheon in asking observance of Holy Week.

"The only hope for our day, the only hope for men, is the spirit of God," the speaker concluded. "Much we do depends on our virtues and on accomplishments of the past," Rev. Whiteside said. He said we are dependent on many circumstances over which we have no control. By re-analyzing our heritage and re-affirming our loyalty, we can insure greater strength of our way of life.

If we forsake what has been bequeathed down to us, the very foundation of our way of life will be lost, the speaker said. A trio from the Northwest Christian college at Eugene presented several sacred numbers. Lion President Lynn Selfridge named the Hobby Show committee for the county fair. Warren Emmott is chairman and members are Walt Henry, Dr. Paul Sievers, Bob Pence and Elbert Hawkins.

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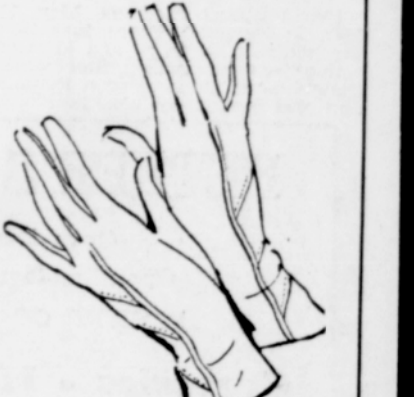
