

School for Booth, Display Designers Set Wednesday

Delegations from all of the organizations of Washington county participating in the county fair September 1 to 4 will meet in the Hillsboro Grange hall Wednesday morning, April 1, to attend the annual school of booth and display design and decoration. It was announced this week by the fair board.

The school is sponsored by the county extension service and the fair board. Heading the program this year will be Curtis Reid, head of the visual education department of Oregon State college.

Opening the program at 10 a. m. will be Ralph Beck of the college extension service, who will talk on "Aims of Community Fairs." Reid will show pictures of booths at various fairs last year and conduct a discussion of methods of improving booth design and assembly.

B. J. Nefsch, expert decorator for the Benedict Display service in Portland, has been scheduled to talk on "Decorative Materials and How to Use Them." He also plans to demonstrate the use of the various materials.

The other member of the speakers' forum is expected to be Oliver Blanchard, decorator of Weiners of Portland, who will discuss design of display and effective presentation.

Business men with display problems, as well as the general public, have been invited to attend.

Social Hygiene Study Program To Start Tonight

The first social hygiene study course in Oregon will be held beginning tonight (Thursday) in Forest Grove under the direction of the Rev. W. H. Genne, Pacific university chaplain. A series of five two-hour meetings will be held.

Two main purposes will be stressed: Control of venereal diseases and their prevention through sex education at home. These meetings are limited to 40 persons.

Classes to be held weekly on Thursdays from 7:30 to 9:30 p. m. at Pacific university. The course will be financed by money from the Christmas Seal sale. Sponsors are the Washington County Public Health association, C. J. Fink, president, and Mrs. Zola F. Morgan, executive secretary.

Those taking the course will be people who are interested enough in the study of sex education to carry it on as a missionary movement to other people or groups who need it.

Need for such a program is clearly evident by statistics recently released which show that, nationally, there are only 10 to 15 percent of the parents qualified to give their children correct sex education.

Mrs. Morgan said, according to a spot check, only about five per cent of parents are capable in Oregon, she added.

The state anti-venereal disease association has helped to set up a sex education program to help the family through literature, leadership, methods of promotion and training of leaders. The latter is the purpose of the courses to be held tonight. Persons interested in this program are asked to contact Mrs. Morgan, executive secretary of the Washington County Public Health association, Room 9, Peterson building, Hillsboro, or if possible to be at the meeting tonight.
