

Hilhi Girl Wins Division Honors In State Tourney

Seventeen-year-old Judy Schendel of Hillsboro won the girls' championship and Bob White of Seattle took division "A" honors at the annual Oregon State Junior Golfers' tournament held here Saturday night.

William Shortt of Portland took top place in class No. 1 of division "B" in the 17-18 age group. All three were awarded the perpetual Sherman trophies donated by Leonard Sherman, veteran local rifle enthusiast.

Miss Schendel, a junior at Hilhi, fired an outstanding prone score of 92 and 93 for a total of 195, barely missing out. Seattle's Jean Mattice who had 94-98 for 192 in third place was Peggy Kestle of Camas with 94-96 for 190.

White topped the field with a score of 201 on 98 prone, 97 sitting and 86 standing. Jim Temple of Camas was a close second with 98-96-86 for 280. William Fisher of Vancouver was third with 96-97-82 for 275.

Hillsboro shooters took two of the next three positions. Robert Nantee had 95-99-89 for 274. Mervel Schlessler of Hillsboro had 97-94-80 for sixth place to follow. Portland's Bill Ware who had 97-95-80 for 272.

Shortt had a high score of 193 out of the 200 possible on prone shooting to top the division "B" field. Tren Williamson of Seattle was second, also having a 190, having an earlier miss on his 19's than the winner.

Kent Looftburrow of Portland was first in class No. 2 of division "B" for the 14-16 age group, firing a 194. Little Richard of Hillsboro was first in class No. 3 of division "B" for the under 13 group with 181.

A field of 82 entered the tournament, the season's big meet for Oregon juniors. Included were nine from Seattle and representatives from a number of towns of the northwest.

Al Tauscher of Multnomah Athletic club, Portland, was in charge of the meet. Annual big state gallery tournament for seniors will be held at the Hilhi range on Sunday, April 11.

Recreation Group Completes Report

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2. That a children's play area at Bailey park be placed high on the council's list of projects to be completed.

3. That a community activity center be constructed and that the Davis property, surrounded by Fifth and Sixth avenues and Edison and Grant streets, be considered as one of the few remaining sites available for a future community park and center.

4. That the city's recreation program include a wide variety of activities ranging from active sports to hobbies, and that cultural activities be given an important position in the program.

Would Change Park Body

In the last installment of its report, released Wednesday by Rev. Warren, the commission recommended reorganization of the present park commission, creation of an advisory recreation board, a charter change requiring approval of the people before park areas can be sold, a budget of \$500 a year for administration of the recreation program, and that action be taken on the entire program by May 1.

The commission recommended that the present park commission be expanded to five members and that the name be changed to the park and recreation commission. The members of the new commission, the commission said, should be selected by the city council from recommendations made by the churches, lodges, service clubs and civic groups. This commission, to be headed by the supervisor of parks and recreation, would meet monthly and would be charged with overseeing the development of city parks and recreation.

Advisory Group Wanted

The report also recommended that an advisory group, to be called the recreation board, be made up of two representatives of every civic group in the city, members to be named by each group. This board would meet at least twice a year to evaluate the recreation program and to advise the council and the park and recreation commission. Members of the park and recreation commission would also be members of the recreation board.

In a diagram suggesting administration of the entire program, the report placed the citizens of Hills-

boro as the final authority, with the chain of command running next to the council, thence to the park and recreation commission, to the superintendent of parks and recreation, and to four sub-divisions under the superintendent. The city manager is to be in an advisory capacity to the council and the park and recreation commission, and the recreation board advisory to the park and recreation commission and the superintendent.

Budget Items Given

The suggested budget includes \$3000 for the recreation supervisor; \$1650 for recreational assistants (summer and year-around), and \$1200 for programming, equipment, and other items. No capital outlay would be required this year, it was pointed out.

The commission pointed out that the initial budget suggested represents an outlay of a little over \$1 per person for the year. The budget would be expanded substantially as the program develops.

"The city government has the same obligation to provide for the recreational needs of the people as it does to provide for police and fire protection," the report states. "There is some disagreement on the per capita expenditure to be made in order to provide for this need."

It added, "but we believe it is not unreasonable to spend somewhere between \$1.50 and \$3 per year per person in the community."

Group to Resign

Recognizing that its job, as outlined by the council, had been completed, Rev. Warren said the commission was prepared to resign as of May 1 "with the full confidence that the city council would concur in the commission's recommendations and that the entire program would be instituted before the resignations became effective."

The commission was organized November 7, 1947, by order of the council. The following persons were named to assist Rev. Warren on the group: J. W. Poynter, James Burdett, Couch Wallace, Blanche Britton, Orange Phelps, Arthur Reeling, Earle Bowman, C. Henry Nelson and Jack Rushlow.
