

Sheriff to Follow Policies, Principles of John Connell

No changes will be made in policies or personnel in the Washington county sheriff's office, Dick Busch said here after his first week as county sheriff. Busch was appointed March 19 by the county court to fill out the unexpired term of John W. Connell, who died the day before.

Busch's appointment was considered almost automatic by virtue of his seniority in the office. He was appointed deputy sheriff by Connell in 1932 and five years later was promoted to chief criminal deputy, a position he held until his appointment as sheriff.

Second in line for the office was Halie Ireland, deputy sheriff since 1936 who has been in charge of the office for the past four years. Both Busch and Ireland are candidates for Republican nomination as county sheriff in the May primary. Connell had planned to retire at the expiration of his present term.

A World War I veteran and former member of the merchant marine, Busch had high praise for Connell's service to the county during his 24 years as sheriff. He said he would follow the general policies and principles followed by Connell with the same force built up by the late sheriff.

Busch was born in Forest Grove in 1897 and attended Watts grade school and Forest Grove high school. He spent 18 months in France and England during the first world war and was discharged in grade of first sergeant. Following his return to this country he was a member of the merchant marine for three years, later working in logging camps on the Nehalem river for seven years. He joined the old Service Garage in Hillsboro in 1929, working as service man until his appointment as deputy sheriff in 1932.

He is a member of the local American Legion post and Knights of Pythias lodge. He has held all officers' chairs in the lodge. He married Gladys McLeod of Hillsboro in 1933. They have two boys, Kent, 11, and Brian, 7.

Presently assigned as deputies under Busch are W. A. Burleigh, tax deputy; Ireland, office deputy; William G. Boyker, Harry King, Albert Nosack, Neville Bagley and Harold Kidd.

He was sworn in as sheriff March 19 by County Clerk W. A. Tupper. In addition to Busch and Ireland, one other Republican is actively campaigning for nomination as sheriff, Kenneth A. Mills, route 3, Beaverton, filed for the post an hour before the filing deadline arrived. One democrat, T. M. Will-

Part of the purpose here being the exchange of everyone's best or favorite recipe, here is one of mine for your consideration. I tried it the first time when I was a brand new bride and my husband's folks came to visit us one evening. After a frantic search among all my new unused cookbooks this one looked the most promising. It is a Hot Milk Cake. Using one whole cup of sugar the top comes out of the oven all brown and crusty. Since there is quite a bit of sugar, grease the pan rather heavily to keep it from sticking.

2 eggs
1 cup sugar
1 cup flour
1 teaspoon baking powder
1 teaspoon salt
1 tablespoon butter
1/2 cup hot milk

Beat eggs until light and thick. Slowly add sugar and beat with spoon 5 minutes or with electric mixer 2 1/2 minutes. Fold sifted dry ingredients into egg-sugar mixture all at once. Melt in hot milk and add all at once. The folding in of dry ingredients and milk should take only 1 minute. Bake in heavily greased 7-inch cake pan in moderate oven (350 degrees) 30 minutes. For cupcakes bake at 375 degrees for 20 minutes. (Makes one dozen.)

William F. Goetter, Hillsboro high school graduate and son of William J. Goetter, Hillsboro, was one of five General Electric men to receive the highest honor bestowed by the company. It was learned there last week. He was presented the Charles A. Coffin award for work of outstanding merit during 1946 and 1947 on transmitter and broadcasting developments.

He was one of three GE men who designed and developed radio transmitting equipment at Electronics Park, Syracuse, N. Y., and was cited "for outstanding skill and ingenuity in designing and developing a new line of frequency-modulation broadcasting transmitters."

Their efforts resulted in many electrical and mechanical features to reduce cost and obtain superior performance, the citation stated. He joined General Electric in 1937 after attending Pacific university for one year and Oregon State college for three years. His father has been connected with the post office department for 30 years and is presently serving as assistant postmaster here. His brother, Wayne L., is also a post office employee.

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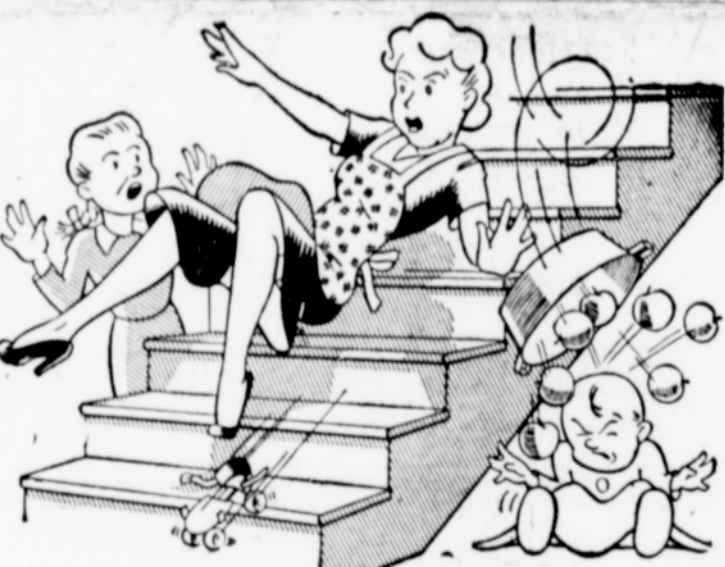
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
