City Council Accepts Recreation Report

10. That five supervisors be hired on a full-time basis during the summer vacation period to supervise the summer program.

11. That the park commission be reorganized to include five members selected by the council from recommendations made by church, lodges, service clubs and civic groups and that the name be changed to park and recreation commission.

12. That an advisory group, to be called the recreation board, be formed of two representatives of each civic group in the city, members to be named by each group.

13. That the city co-ordinate all existing facilities into the program.

14. That the leasing of public buildings for private business be done only for the times the citizens of the community do not have a use for them.

15. That the citizens of Hillsboro be the final authority in administration of the program and that the chain of command run next to the city council thence to the park and recreation commission.

Immediate Needs Given

The following were listed by the commission as the city's immediate needs:

1. Securing of a full-time supervisor.
2. Construction of a swimming pool at the B. W. Barnes school.
3. Summer-time recreation for youth.
4. Children's play parks.
5. Planning for future parks.

The report also recommends that the recreation program include a wide variety of activities ranging from active sports to hobbies. Cultural activities should have an important position in the program, the report stated.

Recognizing that its job, as outlined by the council last November, had been completed, Rev. Warren said the commission was prepared to resign effective May 1 "with the full confidence that the city council would concur in the commission's recommendations and that the entire program would be instituted before the resignations become effective."

Saucepan May Be Used for Canning, Home Agent Says

With canning time rapidly approaching, Dorothy Newton, assistant home demonstration agent here, reminded county homemakers that pressure saucepans can be used successfully for small canning jobs provided the saucepan meets certain requirements and the processing time is lengthened.

For home canning, a saucepan must be tall enough to hold pint jars on a rack with the saucepan cover must have a gauge that allows pressure to be controlled accurately at 10 pounds pressure.

To sterilize vegetables for safe-keeping, processing time at 10 pounds pressure must be 20 minutes longer in a saucepan than the time recommended for a pressure canner.

The longer cooking period is necessary because the pressure saucepan heats quickly, takes only a minute to exhaust air, and cools rapidly after the jars of food are processed. In a regular pressure canner these periods are longer.

Asparagus, 45; lima beans, 55; snap beans, 40; beets, 45; carrots, 40; cream style corn, 105; whole-kernel corn, 75; peas, 60; cubed pumpkin, 75; strained pumpkin, 90; spinach, 65; summer squash, 50.
