

County Restaurants Found Clean by Sanitary Tests

Almost half of Washington county restaurants rate above standard in cleanliness of eating utensils, it was indicated last week by a report of a random survey of 32 eating places throughout the county. Of the restaurants tested, 15 were over standard for all utensils. Of 90 individual tests made, 75 were satisfactory.

Tests were conducted by County Sanitarian T. W. Christiansen and State Sanitarian James Hawkins, using a new mobile laboratory owned by the Oregon state board of health to conduct bacteriological examinations of glasses, cups and spoons. The test is only one of several methods of determining cleanliness of restaurants, the sanitarians said.

Purposes of the tests are to help local restaurant owners to ascertain whether their methods of washing utensils are effective and whether the handling of utensils later is done in a manner to prevent contamination, and to establish a means of measuring effective dish washing procedure and secure uniform standards throughout the state.

Owners may obtain the results of findings as they apply to their respective establishments only from the county health officer. A count of 100 bacteria or less per utensil is considered as evidence of satisfactory dish-washing procedure.

County establishments rating high in the tests included Banks Confectionery, Shake Shop, Tualatin, Bates Pharmacy in Hillsboro, Gas Lunch at Six Corners, Eleanor's Cafe in Forest Grove, Coffee Cup in Beaverton and Hillsboro Depot fountain.

Nine eating places were tested in Hillsboro. The number tested in other county cities was: Beaverton and Forest Grove, four each; Sher-

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Winter Throws Sunday Punch at Red Cross Drive

Old Man Winter, who has thrown his Sunday punch more frequently in recent months than in any other year in a long time, scored another knockout during the past week—this time on the Washington county Red Cross chapter.

Bitter cold, combined with snow, rain and hail, have prevented Red Cross workers from making many of their rounds in the annual fund campaign, which started throughout the nation March 1. With roads almost impassable and the thermometer dropping to the freezing point, local chapter workers report the county quota is still far short.

As an integral part of community life, our Red Cross chapter and its many services affects all of us, directly or indirectly. Rev. Clifford N. Trout, county chairman, said Wednesday, "But how well it can meet the demands made upon it, how many needs it can supply, depends directly upon our support. The interest of our county, it is each person's individual job to give that support now."

The main problem, Red Cross workers say, is visiting everyone to extend a personal request to give. They suggested that if a Red Cross worker has not called on local citizens that they mail contributions to Red Cross headquarters at Hillsboro.

Notwithstanding the unprecedented weather conditions throughout most parts of the country during the campaign, the national quota of \$75,000,000 was three-fifths filled by the end of March. By that time 600 chapters had attained their campaign objectives and another 300 had expected to be oversubscribed.

For the first time in its fundraising history the Red Cross changed its campaign theme in the midst of its fund appeal. The new slogan, "Keep Your Red Cross Ready," was sent out to the 3731 chapters throughout the nation to remind the American people forcefully that the Red Cross is "the voluntary auxiliary to the armed forces and the nation's agency for disaster relief."

The Washington county campaign will continue until the 1948 quota is reached, Rev. Trout said.

Sue on Use of Surplus Taxes

A test suit to determine if income tax surpluses, estimated at \$35,000,000 can be used for general purposes was filed in the circuit court this week. Ex-Governor Charles A. Sprague filed the suit, which seeks to enjoin the state tax commission from considering use of income tax surpluses, after property offsets have been made. If the supreme court, where the suit will finally be determined, holds against the state, the state will not be faced with a "bookkeeping" deficit at the end of the present biennium as the funds can be used to wipe out the deficit estimated to be between \$3,000,000 and \$6,000,000.

There a Difference?
The State of Oregon has never failed to provide well for its wards. At each session of the legislature funds for food, clothing and other necessities are appropriated for the coming biennium. If the price of the commodities goes up above the estimates the emergency board raises the money to meet the higher costs of living of the wards.

Local Opinion on School Patrols
School safety patrols may be established by school districts and boards for the purpose of regulating the conduct of pupils going to and from school, but the patrols may not regulate traffic or perform any functions properly belonging to the police power of the town or city wherein the district is located, according to recent opinion of Attorney General George Neuner.

A school district is not liable in damages for injury or death of pupils while on duty, and superintendents and teachers can be made to respond in damages only in the negligent administration of such a system.

Been Watching Parks Grow?
Oregon has recently added more area to its state park system justifying fast-growing fame for having the most alluring natural parks of any of the states. One of the most beautiful of these, Helmiack park adjoining Camp Adair south of Monmouth, has just been enlarged to five times its original size.

The added area extends along both banks of the Luckiamute river and contains some of the most enchanting sylvan glades in the west, declares S. H. Boardman, state park superintendent.

During the past few weeks two new state parks have been acquired. The Sunset park area, located to the state by Coos county and 400 acres on upper Rogue river between Trail and Prospect. The latter has two miles of frontage on each side of the river and cost the state only \$1600, most of it for back taxes.

Oregonian Slated for Cabinet
Secretary of Agriculture Clinton P. Anderson announced this week he will quit his cabinet post before the end of the fiscal year, confirming the report made exclusively in this column more than six weeks ago. Anderson will run for the senate in New Mexico to succeed Senator Hatch (D), who is not seeking re-election.

Norris E. Dodd, who started his public career in Oregon as an AAA committeeman and rose to head the AAA in Washington, D. C., is scheduled to succeed Anderson.

Liquor by the Drink
A preliminary initiative petition to permit sale of liquor by the drink was filed with the state department this week. The bill would legalize such sales in hotels, restaurants and clubs and on airplanes, steamships and railroads.

All liquor by the drink would have to be bought from the state liquor commission, it would be subject to an additional tax of 25 cents a quart. Dispensers would pay \$500 a year for a license. It could be sold only in places which serve meals, but the liquor could be served in any room in such an establishment. If sufficient signatures are obtained the measure will appear on the November ballot.
