

Official Call Out For 57th Annual Convention GFWC

Mrs. William B. Chandlee, Hillsboro, president of the Oregon Federation of Women's clubs, has announced that the official "call" to the 57th annual convention of the General Federation of Women's clubs has been released. According to the convention call, the 1948 convention will be held in the Municipal auditorium of Portland May 24-29. Mrs. J. L. Blair Buck of Richmond, Va., president of the general federation, will preside over the convention, the first to be held during her administration. She will be assisted by the two vice-presidents, Mrs. H. C. Houghton, Red Oak, Iowa, and Mrs. Oscar A. Ahlgren, Whiting, Ind.

Foreign delegates, many of whom appear in their native garb, will take an active part in the program under the direction of Mrs. John L. Whitehurst, Baltimore, Md., international secretary for the foreign and territorial clubs and a past president of the general federation. Men and women prominent in national and international affairs will discuss pressing current problems. Reports on important general federation projects in international relations and youth conservation will be discussed.

Policy forming resolutions are included in the convention call which has been sent to each club president. Their consideration will be one of the main orders of business during the morning sessions. These include resolutions favoring prompt ratification by the United States of the International Bill of Human Rights; the prompt establishment of an international police force; the renewal of the Reciprocal Trade Agreement Act and the endorsement of the International Trade Organization; and the reform of the U. S. Office of Indian Affairs, both as to policy and administration. Sunday, May 23, at 2:30 p. m. in the out lobby of the auditorium, and continue through the week.

Pre-convention affairs Monday, May 24, will include the state president's luncheon at the Hillsboro home of Mrs. Chandlee, a youth conservation luncheon, and a junior meeting and luncheon.

The convention will open officially with the Oregon banquet Monday night, May 24, followed by a reception for Mrs. Buck. There are luncheons planned for each day restricted to interested groups. These include the junior luncheon Monday open to state junior chairmen and junior clubwomen, the youth conservation luncheon Tuesday for state, district and club chairmen of youth conservation, the press and publicity luncheon Wednesday for state press chairmen and state editors, the radio luncheon and the motion picture luncheon Thursday for state, district and club chairmen, and the foreign and

territorial luncheon, also on Thursday, for delegates, board of directors, state, regional, district and club extension secretaries of foreign and territorial clubs. Besides the Oregon banquet Monday night, there are the five regional dinners Wednesday night open to delegates and visitors from their respective regions, and the sea food buffet dinner Friday night, which is open to all making reservations.

Convention sessions will continue through Friday, May 28, and delegates will take specially arranged sightseeing tours on Saturday.

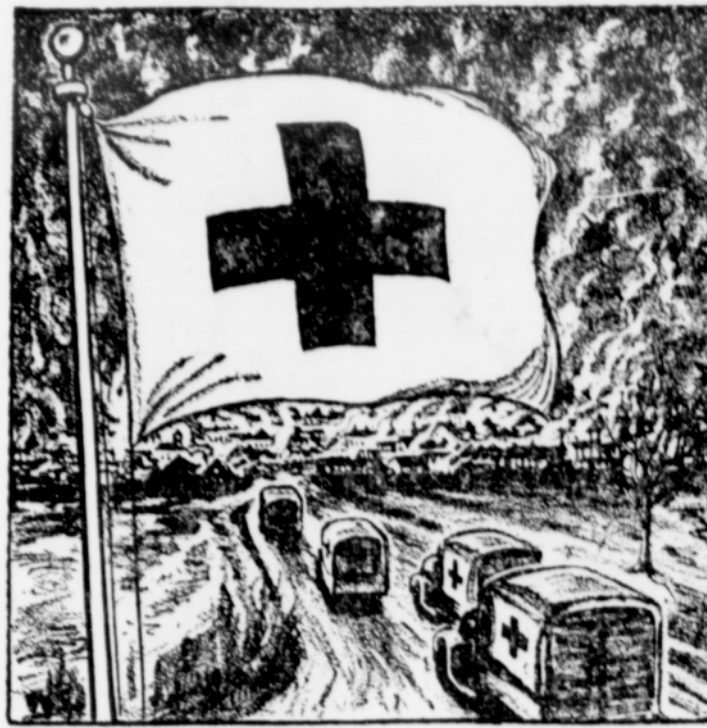

Two Portland youths who were charged with frightening motorists by staging "murders" on the Sunset highway last week were given six-month jail sentences in an Astoria justice court.

The boys, one of whom is in junior high school, had borrowed a .22 caliber rifle with which the younger, 15 years old, "shot" his 18-year-old cousin with blank cartridges. The "shootings" were reportedly staged by the boys to frighten passing motorists, two of whom called Washington county sheriff's deputies and state police to the scene.

The prank was discovered after a long search of the entire area by county and state law enforcement agencies failed to locate the "murder victim."

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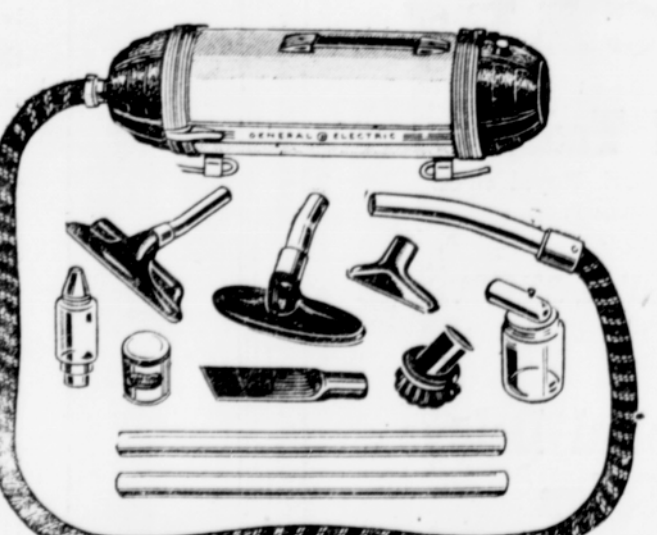
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
