pointed out that from 75,000 to 100,000 persons enter mental hospitals each year, adding that the average stay in these institutions is 10 years. He declared that we all share in the responsibility to prevent psychiatric cases. It presents a major public health problem, Dr. Carter said.

There are more incidents of mental cases in poorly integrated communities with inadequate means of recreation, Dr. Carter continued.

Alcoholism is a psychiatric disease, he said. More than 50 million people in this country drink, and of this number, 600,000 to 700,000 are alcoholics, but there is no relation between heredity and alcoholism Carter declared. If a person wants to recover from this disease he may do so through any acceptable treatment. Alcoholics anonymous is the biggest factor in curing, the doctor stated.
