association that a program honoring Joseph Meek be held at the Tualatin Plains Presbyterian church cemetery. Time of the program has been tentatively set for the afternoon of Decoration Day, with Fred Meek as speaker.

Definite plans will be announced later.

Social Hygiene Guidance Class Sees Trust Film

"Human Growth," the E. C. Brown Trust film, was shown to the social hygiene guidance class April 14 at the physics lecture room, McCormick hall, Pacific university.

The film was brought to the group by Oma DeBernardis, supervisor of visual education, Portland public schools, who reported that surveys show 97 per cent of the people seeing this film on human reproduction and development are in favor of its being shown to students in the 12 to 15-year age group, two per cent are against it and one per cent are undecided.

The script accompanying the film was written by Dr. Lester Beck of the University of Oregon. The pictures were taken at an actual classroom, with real students used from a Los Angeles junior high school and filmed by Eddie Albert Productions.

To date "Human Growth" has been released principally for evaluation purposes. It is intended for use along with health classes, and has demonstrated to parents that social hygiene teaching can be handled on a high level, and that such a film will make teaching more realistic and easier to understand. The main factor which is holding up its use in schools, now that a high percentage of parental approval has been secured, is the lack of adequately prepared teachers to present it.

In some areas where teachers are not available, the E. C. Brown Trust will even undertake to prepare and provide them with the material. It is felt that the reproduction system were discussed at the same time children are learning about the lungs, heart, etc., it would be handled easier and more normally.

"Happy marriages come from happy people," quoted Rev. W. H. Jenne, chaplain of Pacific university at the second half of the class period.

He used the definition of Dr. Karl A. Menninger on mental health as the adjustment of human beings to the world and to each other with a maximum of effectiveness and happiness. Not just efficiency or just contentment, or the grace of obeying the rules of the game cheerfully. It is all of these together. It is the ability to maintain an even temper, an alert intelligence, social conduct, behavior and a happy disposition.

He said the crying need for most fumbling young people is to stop worrying about "habit training" and to turn their attention instead to what their child is feeling about his parents, about the other people in the world, and about himself. Is the child comfortable about his ultimate ability to measure up to the standard expected of him? Is he happy with his contemporaries? Does his relations with his parents make him feel warm, secure and happy even though he doesn't live up to their expectations for him, and he knows this?

Further discussion of the 47 members of the class found that emotionally mature parents promote a feeling of stability and comfort in their children, and that an adequate factual background helps develop emotional security. Consideration of what the child feels is a highly important factor always to be remembered when dealing with him.

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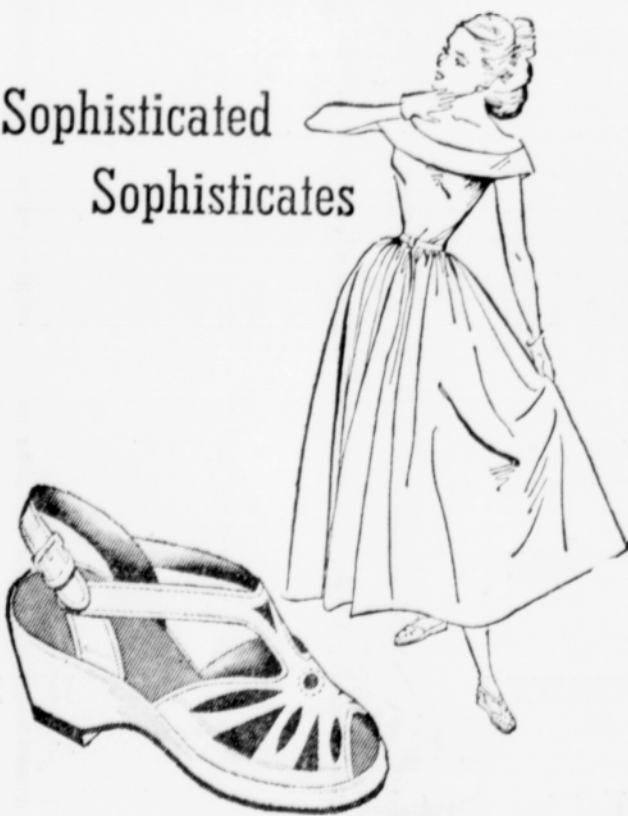
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
