More Almanacs Shown In Argus Window

Last week an almanac of 1861 was displayed in the Argus window, which was the inspiration for others to look for old almanacs among their souvenirs. This week Mrs. Lloyd Gilstrap is exhibiting two almanacs in the window—one of the year 1851 and the other of 1853.

They are called the illustrated Christian family almanacs and contain such pictures as the first prayer in congress, Bunker Hill Monument, John Smithson's home in England which was left to the United States to found, at Washington, The Smithsonian Institute, and others. These were in the almanac of 1851. Many interesting early day historical pictures were also shown in the 1853 copy.

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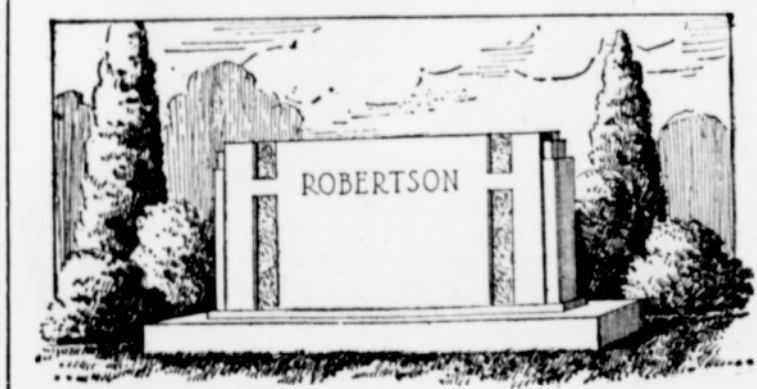

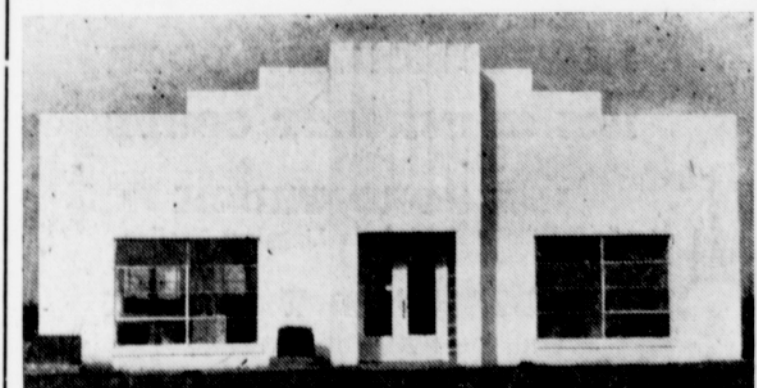
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
