A new two-manual Moller pipe organ was dedicated at the Sunday morning service at St. Peter's Lutheran church at Blooming, honoring 29 former servicemen of the congregation who attended the service in uniform. Rev. E. W. Hinrichs of Yakima, Wash., former pastor of the church, was speaker.

The service flag was taken down from its place in the church and will be framed and hung in a place of honor in the entrance hall of the church. L. Neukirch, senior elder, participated in the flag ceremony. Two gold stars in the flag were for James Meyer and Walter Muhly, who were killed in action in the European theatre of operation. New communion ware and altar brasses were donated in their memory at a previous service.

Organ dedication ceremony was read by Rev. O. H. Moeller, present pastor. C. A. Germeroth is the organist. The new organ was installed in the balcony built by H. Steinko of Hillsboro. Cost of organ and balcony was approximately \$6000. L. Muhly, R. R. Meyer, H. Niermann, C. A. Germeroth and Rev. Moeller served as organ committee.

New altar and pulpit hangings were used for the first time. Ladies of the church prepared and served a pot luck dinner at noon.

Wilbert Grimm, organist of the Zion Lutheran church at Portland, presented an organ concert in the evening.

He was born in Cambridgeshire, England, November 8, 1847, and came to the United States 92 years ago. He lived in Washington county for 21 years prior to moving to Montana three years ago. His wife, Mary, died January 25, 1941.
