Bank, Blooming Softballers Win in Exhibition Games

Blooming defeated Troutman's Store 5 to 2 and Commercial bank swamped Moose lodge 18 to 0 in opening exhibition games of the Hillsboro softball league Friday evening. The games were watched by a large crowd which braved the weather, then sat in cars circling around the field.

Following opening day ceremonies featuring Mayor E. A. Griffith, Herman C. Ruecker and Harry Robinson, president of the Portland Softball association, the two top ticket-selling teams from each league met in the King's-X contests.

Troutman's Store, defending National league champions, drew first blood in the top of the third by pushing across one run. Blooming retaliated with two runs in their half of the third and added three more in the fourth. The Troutman squad added their second run in the fifth.

Blooming batters collected nine hits from the offerings of Bill Troutman. Vic Fricke limited the Troutmen men to seven bingles. Oscar Mully and Ken Brandaw collected doubles, the only extra-base hits in the contest.

Manager Walt Ruecker handcuffed the Moose lodge hitters, giving up but two hits as his teammates ganged up for 18 runs off nine hits and seven Moose errors. Second baseman Alvin Schumacher and Third baseman Bob Burkhalter hit for the circuit to lead the Commercial bank hitters. The bank team is defending district and American league champion.

Mayor Griffith tossed out the first pitch, with Ruecker batting and Robinson catching. Fricke, district commissioner, was master of ceremonies.

Both regular league opening games scheduled for Monday night were postponed because of showers. Commercial bank and Tigard Electric will play off their game Friday. Date for the West Union-Knights

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of Columbus game has not been set. Other games scheduled are: Thursday (tonight)—Valley Heating vs. Moose lodge and Laurel vs. Troutman's Store. Friday—Aloha vs. Bethany. Monday—Knights of Columbus vs. Blooming. Tuesday—Tigard Electric vs. Perfection Bakery and Verboort vs. Laurel.
