

Training Methods Talked By Social Hygiene Class

Group leadership and training methods were discussed by the Social Hygiene Class of nearly fifty at Marsh Hall, Pacific university, with Rev. W. H. Genie leading the discussion.

It was pointed out that the difference in the circumstances under which this group was studying and the usually planned study group were numerous. Views expressed were that it was too mixed since it included all ages from different communities, backgrounds and needs for the material being studied.

To insure more satisfaction a group would use a round-table pattern of seating and discussion, be composed of people who would have a similar need for learning, such as those who planned to teach classes, or parents of children in the same age group. Comfortable seating and well-lighted and ventilated rooms would help learning, but whether meetings should be held in homes or in neutral territory was left undecided. A place where all attending could be completely at ease and free from any tension would be ideal it was agreed.

A good leader will encourage group discussion. It was advised to ask no definite "yes" or "no" type of questions. This would close the subject and block the flow of discussion.

A tentative plan yet to be decided for one or two more meetings in this series may enable those interested to have further study on social hygiene guidance.

War Declared On Loose Dogs

Any person catching a loose dog killing chickens or chasing stock is permitted by state law to shoot such dog on his own property regardless of whether the dog is licensed or not, according to D. F. Kanneman, county dog control officer.

Kanneman issued the statement Tuesday after receiving several complaints of dogs chasing stock and biting women and children. All complaints should be made to Kanneman, he said, by telephoning Hillsboro 3098.

Persons desiring to dispose of their dogs were also asked to contact Kanneman. He added that state law prohibits dumping dogs on any road or highway. Violators are subject to a minimum fine of \$100 or 60 days in jail or both.

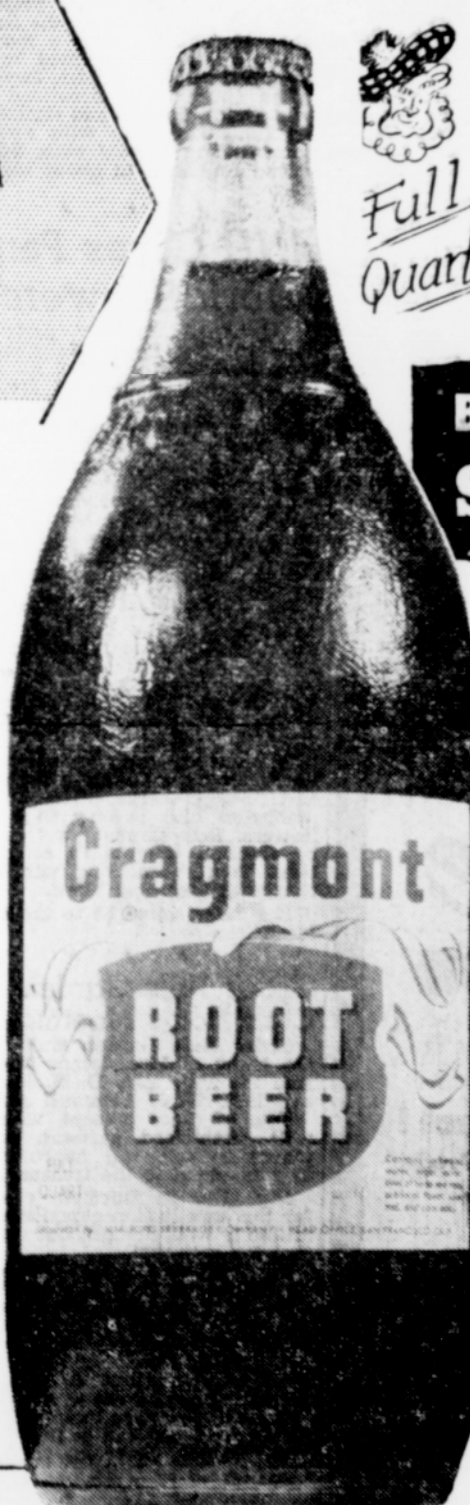
