Cedar Hills Gets 100 Apartments

Construction is scheduled to start immediately on 100 garden court type apartments in Cedar Hills, the Cedar Hills company announced Monday. Total cost of the work has been estimated at about \$1,000,000. Work will be handled by Myron Martin of Portland.

The apartments will be located in 44 units and will be grouped in a 5½-acre landscaped tract adjacent to the future Cedar Hills business district. They will be of concrete brick construction. Commonwealth, Inc. rental agents said it is hoped that some of the apartments will be ready for occupancy by mid-summer.

A majority of the apartments will have two stories, with bedrooms on the second level. A garage for each apartment and basements with laundry and storage facilities are planned. A mortgage of \$845,000 has been approved by FHA for construction, it was reported.

The 14 building units will include 15 apartments with one bedroom, living room and combination kitchen and dinette; 11 apartments with a living room, dining room, kitchen, three bedrooms and double plumbing; 36 apartments with a living room, dining alcove, kitchen and two bedrooms; and six apartments with a living room, dining room, kitchen and three bedrooms.

VFW Opposes Bonus Petition

Terminating the efforts of Yank Legion, a veterans' organization with headquarters in Portland, to secure a \$500 bonus for veterans of the last war as "premature," Francis C. Gates, Bend state commander of Veterans of Foreign Wars, said Wednesday that VFW members throughout the state are being asked not to sign bonus petitions soon to be circulated.

The petition was filed with the state elections bureau recently by Roland C. Bartlett, Portland, national commander of Yank Legion. Signatures of 18,999 registered voters must be filed by July 1 to place an initiative measure on the ballot in November.

Gates said that VFW is taking the stand that legislation pertaining to veterans' affairs should emanate from the state legislature and then be referred to voters. "Many states have provided bonuses for veterans of the last war. VFW believes that state legislators are best qualified to study the question, determine how large a bonus should be paid and a source of funds for a bonus," Gates said.

Bernard Mansfield, Portland, state legislative chairman of VFW, said "Putting the question of a bonus before the voters this fall would be injurious to a chance of having a bonus approved at a more opportune election." Mansfield also pointed out.
