

Mrs. Gunn Speaks Auxiliary Meet; Prizes Awarded

Mrs. C. Gunn of Portland, volunteer hospital instructor in the Veterans' hospital, was the speaker at the evening of the American Legion Auxiliary meeting Tuesday evening at the Knights of Pythias hall. Mrs. Gunn spoke on the importance of volunteer workers in the hospital, who must take a two-day indoctrination course in order to qualify for this work. She said the need for this work is urgent and complimented the hospital workers of the local unit very highly. She praised the Veterans' hospitals in Portland and Roseburg for the marvelous work being carried on, but stated that it would be 1950 or 1951 before the peak of hospitalization would be reached as a result of World War II. Mrs. Gunn is also a member of the state rehabilitation commission and a past department president and has been chosen as campaign chairman for Oregon's candidate, Laura Goode, for national president for 1949.

Mrs. Eda Zollezio, department hospital chairman of the Veterans' hospital in Portland, and Mrs. Grover Francis, a past department president and chairman of the department past presidents' party, gave short talks.

Maybelle McCov, chairman in charge of Buddy Poppies and the poppy poster contest in the schools of Hillsboro and surrounding community, presented the winners and Mayor E. A. Griffith presented prizes, which were \$2.50 for first prize in first and second divisions; two second prizes \$2 each, one in each division, and there were four tied for third place with a prize of \$1 each. One dollar was given from the floor for the most unique.

Prizes awarded were: Class one—Allen Leinan, Witch Hazel school; first; George Rushlow, second; Barbara Travis and Wyman Gernhart, tied for third; James Snook, honorable mention.

Class two—Dean Olson, first; Elora Scrivner, second; Jerry Bishop and James Wood, tied for third; Deilan Gavette, honorable mention.

In first prize winning posters in both classes were sent to compete in the state contest.

Irene Burt, teacher in the local grade schools and Americanism chairman, presented the first, second and third winners in the Americanism essay contest sponsored by the Auxiliary. Mayor E. A. Griffith presented the medals, first going to Peter Amacher, second to Marjorie Forsyth, and third to Burton Zuercher.

"These are our future citizens of America, and their efforts are greatly appreciated and commended for taking part in these contests," Mrs. Mary Hadley, president of the unit, declared.

Several of the school taking part in the poppy poster contest presented musical numbers and skits. Ronald Clark, music instructor at the high school, presented several songs by the Madrigal chorus.

The month of May having been set aside for special tribute to all Gold Star ladies, mothers, wives, daughters and sisters of those who died in service, Mr. Clark sang "Mother, Mother," dedicating it to these ladies.
