

Permanent License Plates Plan Developed by Newbry

Earl T. Newbry, candidate for Republican nomination for secretary of state, has developed plans for permanent license plates and changes in the distribution of license plates that will save Oregon taxpayers several hundred thousand dollars per year and provide more convenient service to motorists, he said this week. Newbry was appointed secretary of state after the accidental death of Robert S. Farrell Jr. last fall.

Newbry first served the state as a representative in the 1939 and 1941 sessions of the legislature, and as a senator in the 1942 and 1946 sessions. As a legislator he was a strong champion of highway and agricultural legislation. In 1947 he was chairman of the senate labor and industries committee. Not a professional politician, Newbry is a successful fruit grower and shipper and owns a 250-acre orchard in the Rogue river valley. Since he became secretary of state he has a daughter, Shirley, 16, a student at Salem high school. His wife, the former Ruth Johnson, is a native of Oregon and a graduate of Oregon State college. Newbry was born in Colorado and attended Washington State college. He is 48. A civic leader, Newbry is a past president of the Ashland chamber of commerce and a director of the Jackson county chamber. He also is an active member of his American Legion post and the Rotary club.

Crippled Collect \$6832.98 in Drive

The Chin Up Club of Oregon received \$6832.98 from the building fund drive last year according to Beth Sellwood, president. The net clear from expenses was \$5768.30. It took 15.56 per cent out of every dollar for expense. The club has \$3491.22 in its regular building fund, which makes a complete total including building fund drive of \$9259.52. When the club can, it will buy land and expand its project, build a work shop, living quarters and permanent home for Oregon's crippled and physically handicapped persons. The club's officers, trustees, advisers, attorneys and workers receive no pay for the time they give the club. All officers are handicapped, except some of the trustees, the advisers are not disabled. Members who are 25 per cent or more crippled or physically handicapped pay no membership dues. The club is non-denominational, non-profit and non-political.

Hot Dog! Fishing Season! Not that anyone needs to be reminded of it. From now until the end of summer the stock answer will be "He's gone fishing." Fishing has always fascinated me. It looks so easy and ordinary fishing that is. Some people like to go way up-stream over boulders and around mountains. They remind me of bulldozers. They keep going no matter what is in front of them. Beats me how they can scrape up enough energy to do anything after they get into those remote places. And, not only that... after any fish are caught there's always some fool on every fishing trip who wants to catch a fish! The darned things have to be carried back to camp. The boys who catch lots of fish like to display them all set up in a bed in front of Taylor's or some other fancy place. The boys who don't catch anything are reluctant to admit that they even went fishing. But catch any fish or not, mention fishing season to a sportsman about this time of year and all get the same gleam in their eyes and whip out all their gear. Ah, Spring, ain't it grand? Speaking of fishing gear, sneak down to Taylor's to see all the paraphernalia they have! Looks like they have EVERYTHING! There was one real fancy lure that really got me! Made out of rubber — realistic enough to fool any "poor fish" in the shape of scorpions, caterpillars, beetles, and other gruesome things supposedly attractive to the "fin and scale crowd." (Wouldn't it throw a charge into a dinner party to have one of these guests find one of these in the soup or salad?) I have a friend who hooks one in an orange in the fruit dish. Back to Taylor's. Bill says not to throw out any broken equipment... he has all kinds of tools to fix all kinds of rods, reels, Johnson Motors or most anything else.

Lots of young people have an entertainment problem living in small homes with combination living room-dining rooms, or small "nooks." I think buffet suppers are one of the nicest and easiest ways to serve dinner if the dining space is limited. An ordinary dining table may all used... simply place your food on one part of the table, and your plates, silver, napkins, etc. on the other end. You may set up card tables for your guests to eat on, or let them eat on their laps.

Here are a few tips to make your next buffet supper less work for the hostess. To avoid "ganging-up" as your guests serve themselves, divide your main into two parts... place a bowl or platter at each end of your table. Place the silver at the very end of the table so that the guests may pick it up after selecting their food. It is nice to offer both linen and paper napkins... some folks hesitate to use linen napkins and would rather have the paper one.

Now here is a quick easy dish that could be used very nicely for a buffet supper. I'll give it here in the right proportion to serve six.

Take a can of cream of mushroom soup, a can of tuna (or any other fish you may prefer), combine with as much cooked noodles as you desire and mix together. Season with salt, pepper, paprika, a touch of savory, and a dash of garlic salt. Pop it into the oven and bake until the top is nice and brown. For a variation take the same can of tuna, make a cream sauce with the can of mushroom soup as a base, chop up some hard boiled eggs and cooked celery, throw the whole thing together with a touch of pimento for a little color. Add the same seasoning and serve over steamed rice.

Entertaining can be lots of fun for everyone... including the hostess. Take advantage of any short-cuts you may see, make things as nice for your guests and as easy for yourself as possible. Every one can see whether you have a good time, and it makes them feel uncomfortable to see their hostess flitting around in a mad dash here and there to see that every one has what they need. Your guests take their cue from you. By your appearance and bearing show them that everything is under control and that you are all going to have a wonderful time!

Labor Act Repeal Asked by DeCicco

Mike M. DeCicco, candidate for national committeeman on the Democratic ticket, has asked Oregonians to elect congressmen and senators who will repeal the Taft-Hartley act.

A Portland business man, he said he could see no peace for labor or management with the labor law on the statute books. Twelve grain puffers made by McEwen Manufacturing Company and Lancaster Machine Works at Washington and Dennis streets, Hillsboro, have been recently completed and will be shipped Monday to Shanghai, China, to be used for puffing rice.

Each puffer weighs 650 pounds. Corn is puffed at 175 pounds of pressure; wheat, 230 pounds of pressure, and rice at 200 pounds of pressure. The Hillsboro shop and a company at Omaha, Neb., are the only two companies in the United States making these machines, said H. E. McEwen, designer-tester.

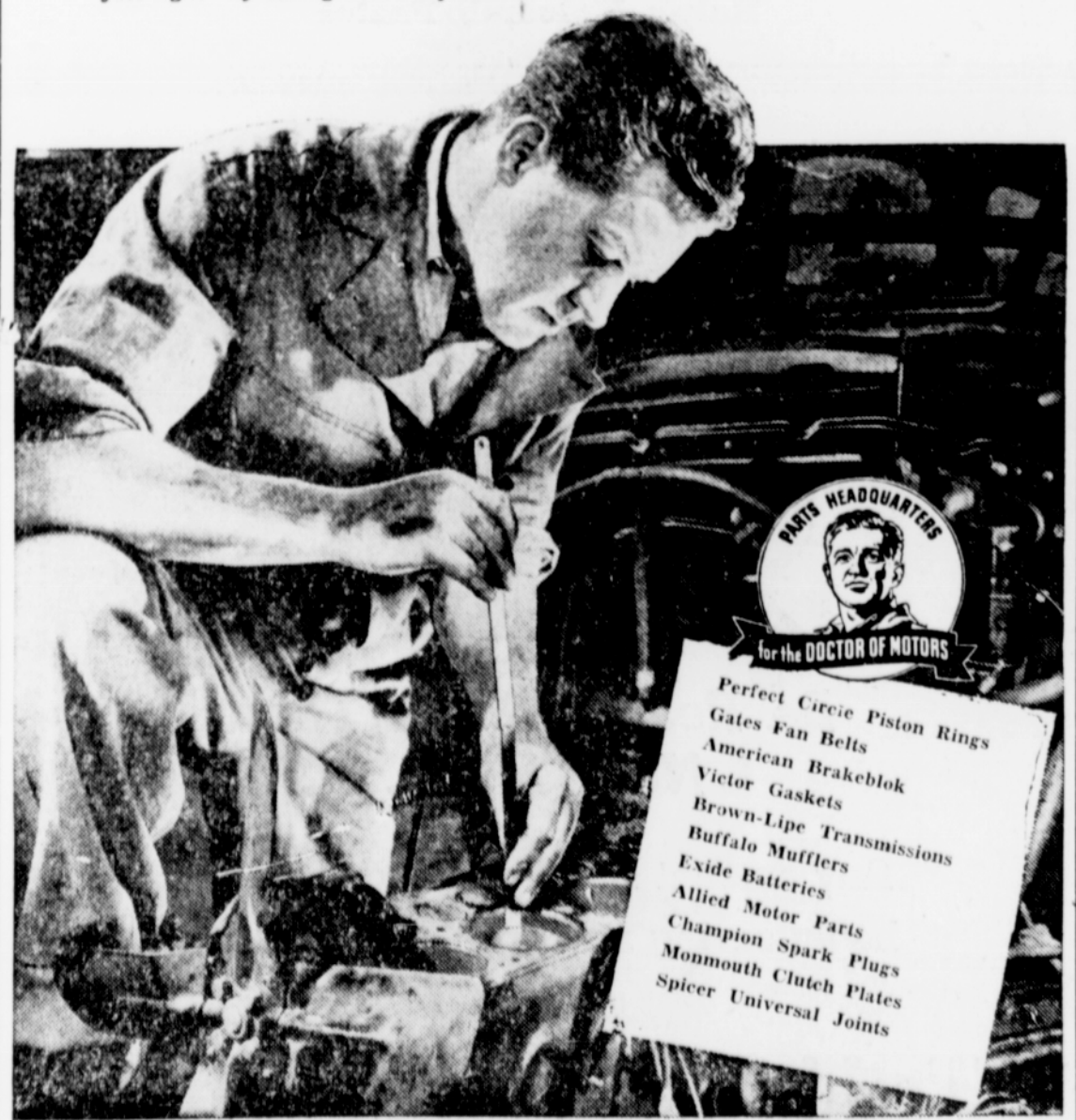
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
