Voter Registration Jumps 50 Per Cent in 3 1/2 Years

Washington county's voter registration for the May 21 primary skyrocketed to almost 50 per cent over the figure for the November, 1944, general election, according to figures released last week by County Clerk W. A. Tupper. The record-breaking total of 27,537 gives Republicans an edge of 15,271 to 11,991. While the Republican strength is slightly higher than in 1944, the percentage of gain was less than made by the Democrats. Republicans increased 42 per cent since 1944. Democrats increased 52 per cent.

Graduation, Band Officers to Be Installed May 19

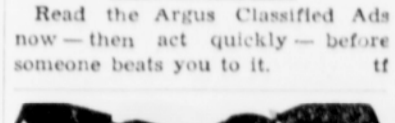

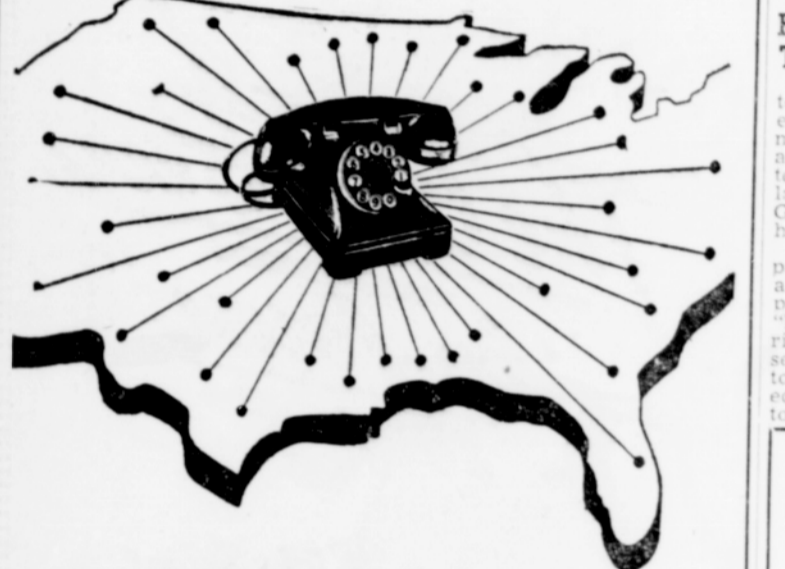
