

Hilhi Agriculture Shop Rated High

Hillsboro high school's new shop for agriculture and woodworking last week was rated by the state department of education as one of the best in the state. The statement was made in a letter to Miss Wilma Merrill, school district clerk. The letter rated the school as standard. "The union high school at Hillsboro has undergone considerable increase in enrollment in recent years due to general population increases and proximity to Portland," the letter stated. "In spite of the necessary adjustments the school is functioning smoothly and an effective educational program is being carried on."

The students were described as courteous, attentive and having respect for public property. The morale of the teaching staff was said to be good and they are working in harmony with one another and with the administration. "An outstanding job is being done in language arts in regard to approach, motivation, methods, and results obtained," the letter added. "The letter added that the school is making instruction in English a pleasant as well as profitable experience. This is one of the more difficult tasks which educators must face."

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THE WILLIS — Chapman & Evans, well known architects, recently made a study for the An-thracite Industries to determine the little details of design that cause some houses to receive wide popular acceptance while others with substantially the same living accommodations seem to leave the public cold. They learned definitely that many people like low, squatty houses that give the impression of hugging the ground. In the Willis, designed by Chapman & Evans this popular feature was accentuated by extending the kitchen wing's long sweeping roof line down to the dormer that lights the dinette, to within four feet of the ground. By the adroit use of dropped levels, the added space serves to house the cellar steps and is lighted by its own window underneath the dormer.



Another preference, indicated by the study, was a leaning toward the spread-out Cape Cod or Ranch House styles featuring sheltered foot line garden or patio. Inasmuch as these types cost more per square foot than the more compact designs, the Willis is a practical compromise. It gives the appearance of rambling, yet is not too far from the economical square. It permits a front terrace sheltered on two sides and a porch sheltered on three.

Hospitable, friendly and livable, The Willis is a mellow house. It should prove an ideal home for the family that can afford to spend a few dollars more than the cost of the minimum four rooms and bath bungalow. It was designed to FHA standards and its electrical layout carries the seal of approval of National Adequate Wiring Bureau. Detailed architect's blueprints and specifications from which the house may be built cost \$7.50 per set, and may be obtained only from Housing Plan Service.—Write in care of the Argus.

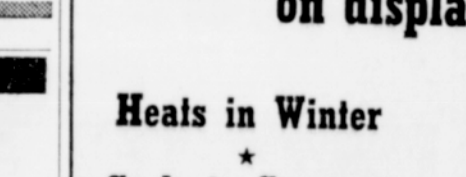
Lightning Strikes Here
