

Spartan Bats Go to Work As McMinnville Falls, 11-2

Coach Rudy Fox's Hilli Spartans went on another batting spree on the local diamond Tuesday afternoon to rack up an 11 to 2 win over McMinnville, their second in a row by big scores over the former league-leaders. The win gave Fox's nine sole possession of second place in T.V.V. league standings and dropped McMinnville to a tie for fourth place.

Dick Waibel successfully muffled the Grizzly batters in every inning but one and gave up just one hit in the seven-inning contest. It was his fourth win in five starts this season. Roger Madsen replaced Waibel with two away in the seventh and struck the last man out. Ron Reule, Lee Alvord, Neal McMinn and Jim Nierman accounted for nine of Hilli's 12 hits as the Spartans brought runners home in four of their six innings at the plate. Hilli drew first blood in the second when Nierman drew his first of two bases on balls. Al Hunsburg singled in the field and both came home on errors.

Hilli scored three more runs in the third when Alvord doubled. Bobby Frantz and Nierman walked and all came home on two errors.

Sportsmen Dig Deep for Travel

Ninety-nine per cent of the fishermen in the United States use the motor vehicle for transportation to and from fishing trips, a recent survey by the AAA, reported in the April issue of The Oregon Motorist, shows.

The survey indicated an average of 25 to 30 per cent of fishing and hunting expenses are for automobile transportation. This, according to The Motorist, is the greatest single cost item in the sportsman's budget, exceeding even that of rod and reel, or shotgun and shells.

While there are no figures covering the state of Oregon alone, The Motorist points out that in this state virtually all lakes, streams and coast areas popular with fishermen are easily accessible from good roads, and in most cases the roads lead directly to the fishing waters.
