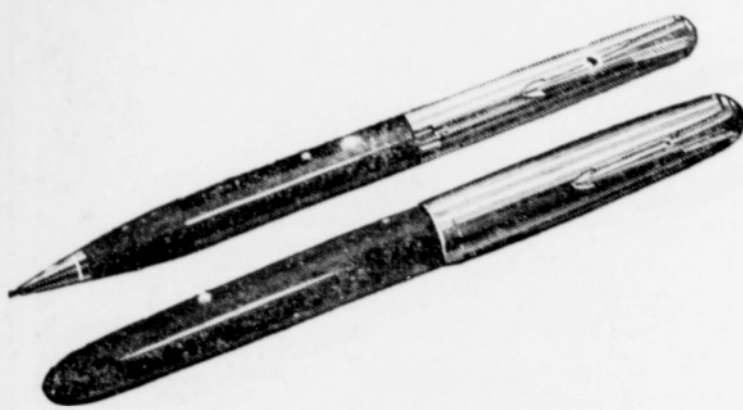
Four Communities Start Discussions

Hillsboro Garden Club Flower Show Scheduled May 28

Hillsboro Garden club will hold a flower show at All Saints Episcopal church, parish hall, Fourth and Lincoln, Friday, May 28. Mrs. Lee MacIntyre is general chairman of the event.

The public is invited to exhibit. Rules are as follows:

1. Entries will be accepted from 9 a. m. to 5 p. m. on May 28.
2. All entries must be received at 10:30 a. m. on May 29.
3. Entries may not be removed from show until 5 p. m.
4. Show will be open to visitors from 10 a. m. to 5 p. m.
5. Judges and clerks only, may be present during judging of exhibits.
6. Exhibitor can make only one entry in each class.
7. Flowers exhibited must be grown by exhibitor under garden conditions.
8. When possible, label specimen exhibits, botanical and common names.
9. Entries may not be moved without assistance of committee.
10. Entries not conforming to rules of schedule will be disqualified.
11. Specimens must be accompanied by own foliage.
12. Awards will be ribbons, 1st, 2nd, and 3rd.
13. Sweepstakes awarded to exhibitor having highest number of points.

1. Horticultural Section A. Specimen consists of 1 bloom or 1 spike. Group consists of 5 or more blooms or spikes, unless otherwise stated.

8. Flowers submerged in water in clear glass container.
9. Miniature arrangement (not to exceed 3 inches over all)—(a) Single; (b) Pair.
10. Miniature arrangement (not to exceed 4 inches over all)—(a) Single; (b) Pair.
11. Cup and saucer arrangement.
12. Arrangement in novelty container.
13. Arrangement of floating flowers.
14. Children Exhibit Section C. Class 1. Novelty arrangement (not to exceed 4 inches over all).
2. Miniature arrangement (not to exceed 6 inches over all).

Rev. J. Kennedy At Foursquare

Rev. and Mrs. J. Craig Kennedy will speak at the Foursquare church, 349 South Fourth avenue, Saturday night, May 15, at 7:45 o'clock.

The Rev. and Mrs. J. Craig Kennedy are ministers and Youth Directors in the Elm Foursquare Gospel churches in England. They have been in that movement for over 20 years, and have traveled extensively in Europe, Canada, and the States. The Kennedys pastored a church in the East end of London during the war, and were in national service as fireguards and rescue workers. Their church was situated in one of the most heavily devastated districts of London. They tell how that at the height of the Blitz Bomb attack, 700 houses were being destroyed or damaged an hour, and that in all, 23,000 houses were completely destroyed and over a million damaged in just over 80 days, and that London was under constant bombardment from V1 and V2 for seven months prior to D-Day.

They have many stories of rescue work, and of the heroism of the people, of the destruction of the homes of their members, and yet they came through the war without the loss of one member. Dr. Kennedy will show 16mm sound motion pictures of the "Great Fire of London," "The Buzz Bomb Attack on London," and "The Atomic Bomb."

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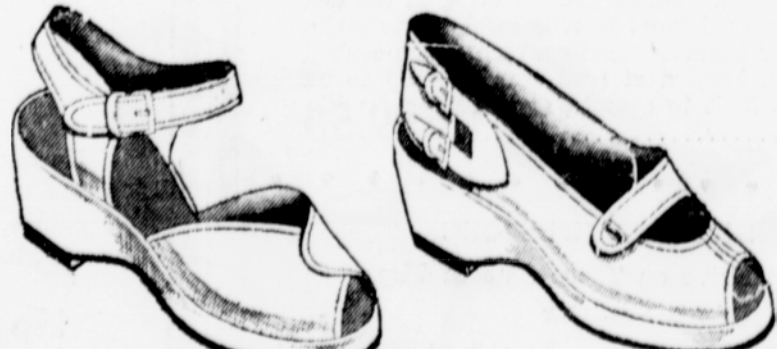
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
