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Dr. W. S. Gordon, Veteran Methodist Preacher, Succumbs

Dr. William Steward Gordon, 80, retired Methodist minister, died Saturday, May 8, at his home in Portland, and funeral services were held Monday afternoon at 1 o'clock at J. P. Finley & Son Mortuary, with interment in Forest Grove cemetery. Dr. Louis Kaub officiated.

Dr. Gordon's ministry, all in the Oregon conference, covered 38 years. He enrolled more than 2000 converts in the church and performed about 2000 marriage ceremonies.

He was born near Danville, Ill., April 21, 1868, and in 1890 the family moved to Oregon. They lived on the J. S. Griffin land claim near Hillsboro for seven years, and later moved to near Forest Grove. He attended Hillsboro schools, Tualatin Academy and Pacific university. He took his doctorate at Willamette university.

When he was 17 years old he was granted an exhorter's license by the quarterly conference of Hillsboro Methodist church and soon thereafter was given a local preacher's license. His first sermon was delivered in West Union Baptist church in February 1885.

He began a career as a teacher before he was 18. He resigned as principal of the high school at Corvallis to enter the ministry.

Dr. Gordon was a writer of verses. Some of his poems were set to music. He also wrote for various church publications and newspapers. He wrote a poem on each of the three horses of Judy Gates, his grand-niece.

He is survived by his wife, the former Elizabeth Stebbings of Victoria, B. C. whom he married in August, 1890; two daughters, Mrs. Evelyn Ekstrom and Mrs. Helen Ambler, and four grandchildren, all of Portland, and two sisters, Mrs. Minnie Gates, Hillsboro, and Mrs. Ella Leiter, Forest.
