

Sheriff Position Sought by 1 Democrat, 3 Republicans

With four candidates actively campaigning for the office, the county sheriff's post rates as the second most sought after office in Washington county's May 21 primary. Three Republicans and one Democrat are listed on the ballot. Most sought after post is county commissioner, for which six candidates are running.

Only Democrat seeking the post is T. M. Williams, Hillsboro business man and farmer. A 50-year-old native of Texas, Williams is vitally interested in the growing problem of juvenile delinquency and would work with a humane approach in correcting the problem. "Although one cannot be too lenient in upholding the law, every case, every person should be dealt with in a humane manner," he says. "One must consider the other fellow as an equal and a sheriff must always be servant to the public."

His platform is based on service to all of the people in the county. A sheriff is no longer a servant of the people if he becomes a boss after elected, he adds.

When elected, I will fulfill all of my promises and will strive to be a good public servant to all of the people of every part of the county.

Williams said he filed for the office at the request of many Republicans and Democrats, and that his primary purpose is to bring back to Washington county the two-party system and to serve the people faithfully. He says he has made no political promises and never will.

He favors placing permanent or mobile sub-stations for sheriff's deputies throughout the county to give outlying districts "better protection at a saving to the taxpayers."

Williams is endorsed by the Democratic party, the Progressive Voters' club of Washington county and organized labor and expects enough Republican support in the general

election to place him in the sheriff's seat. He came to Washington county in 1943 and farmed near Banks for three years before buying a small farm on the Road road south of Hillsboro.

One of three Republicans seeking nomination for the post is Kenneth A. Mills, route 3, Beaverton farmer. He has lived in Hazeldale for the past 40 years and has served for six years as director of the Hazeldale school board.

In a statement on his candidacy, he has said, "If I am nominated and elected, I will honestly and faithfully fulfill the duties of my office to the best of my ability and to the best interests of the people of Washington county."

He has said he does not believe in "making false promises" but will give careful consideration to each problem as it arises. "I believe in treating everyone fair and equal," he adds.

He was born in Portland in 1932 and moved with his parents to Hazeldale in 1907.

Mr. and Mrs. Harry E. Stofor have purchased the Chic Inn on the Portland highway east of Hillsboro. Grand opening under the new management was held Saturday after being renovated. The inn was formerly owned by T. W. Mallory, who will continue to operate the service station and caters there.

Soil Conserving Program of 4-H Youth Renewed

Announcement has been made that the 1948 National 4-H Soil Conservation program will be conducted in Oregon for the fifth consecutive year.

The activity is designed to encourage 4-H members to develop a farm family program of soil conservation, for present and future production, which will prevent soil wastage and deterioration on the home farm.

Merit awards for superior 4-H soil conservation records on county, state, sectional and national levels again offered by Firestone include medals of honor for county winners and \$50 U. S. Savings bonds for the six highest rating entrants in each state. Sixteen selected state winners each receive a sectional award of a trip to the Chicago 4-H Club Congress next November. Eight sectional winners are receiving a \$300 scholarship.

County club agents will furnish complete information regarding this activity.

W. D. Lovegren Dies in Portland

Funeral services were held in Cottage Grove last week for William D. Lovegren, 49, former resident of Cherry Grove who died May 2 in a Portland hospital. Rites were conducted from the Assembly hall church, with interment in Rest Haven cemetery in Eugene.

Mr. Lovegren was born July 12, 1898, and spent his childhood in Preston, Wyo. He moved to Cherry Grove at the age of 13 and finished grade school there. He graduated from Oregon State college in 1923. He was married to Martha Linde January 12, 1924. Their marriage was the first in Cherry Grove Baptist church. Their first home was in Bridal Veil. They lived in Cottage Grove for the past 11 years, where they owned and operated a large sawmill.

Survivors include his wife; two sons, Kenneth and Edward, both at home; his mother, Mrs. Effie Pearson and Elva Loveston, of Cherry Grove, Mrs. Edna Bruce of Keyes, Cal., and Mrs. Mabel Tupper of Placerville, Cal.; and three brothers, Philip, Levi and a missionary in China, and Teon of Cottage Grove.

Heirs to Estate Sought in State

Henry (or Harry) Newton, who would be aged if living, and, therefore, more likely his children, are being sought in western Oregon to claim a \$100,000 estate left by a relative who died recently without closer kin.

Walter C. Cox, probate genealogist, 208 S. LaSalle St., Chicago, who specializes in tracing missing relatives to settle estates, is directing the hunt, he announced today.

"The Henry (or Harry) Newton sought," Mr. Cox said, "was born in Ohio in about 1875, and would be 73 years old if not deceased."

"After growing up in Ohio he traveled west while still a young man and settled, according to our information, somewhere in western Oregon." He was last heard from in that area about 35 years ago.

"He is reported to have married and had children. If he is deceased, the children would succeed to claim the estate. Records of the deceased are unclear as to whether Newton's first name was Henry or Harry."

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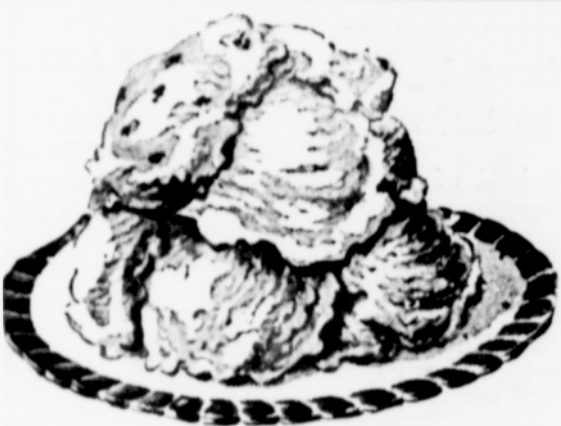
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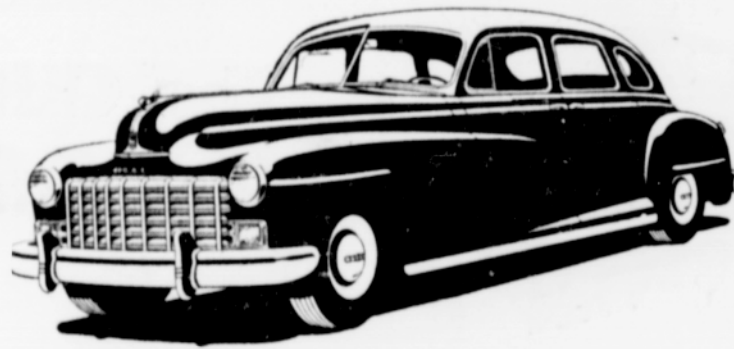
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
