 great mass of middle class citizens who as independent voters have decided the presidential elections in recent years," he continued. "Former Governor Stassen is the man who has proven that he commands the vote and is the man who can win for the Republican party."

Best Chance of Winning
 He said Stassen "always takes the people into his confidence, is always frank in stating the facts" and has shown by the record that he has the best chance of defeating President Truman in November.

He called on Oregon voters to select their choice for president on the man's record, program and on any one particular issue. A candidate's complete program and his ability to win in November are the important factors he considered in the primary, he added.

"What we need most now," he added, "is more of the human relationship, human engineering, and a type of leadership that can inspire that approach. The eyes of the entire nation will be on Oregon voters May 21. I have a notion that as well as Nebraska so will Oregon go."
