### Dr. W. Pembauer AAUW Luncheon Speaker Saturday

Europe needs faith and hope in the future most today, and cultural as well as political leadership, even more than she needs food and clothing, so said Dr. Waltraud (Mickey) Pembauer of Salzburg, Austria, at the AAUW luncheon meeting Saturday in the Peter Boscow school cafeteria.

"America has a terrific responsibility of leadership—to defend all the cultures of civilization," Dr. Pembauer said. "By contributing materially to the rehabilitation of Europe she not only defends civilization economically, but also those things which are dear and important to us—values which make life worth living."

There is a great shortage of food in Austria as elsewhere in Europe, Dr. Pembauer said. This is because the most fertile areas in Austria (which country itself is about one-third the size of Oregon) are occupied by Russian troops and they do not contribute any of the food grown here to Austrian economy.

"And there you have the paradox," Dr. Pembauer said, "the Americans shipping food in on one side, and the Russians shipping it out on the other."

The United States has given a loan to Austria so that she might buy food, Dr. Pembauer said. Relief organizations help and also the neutral countries of the war, such as Sweden and Switzerland. The American army also provides a meal for every school child in the American occupation zone.

Austria can do nothing without American help, Dr. Pembauer stated. In addition to the loss of the most fertile farm lands to the Russian troops, there is a shortage of seeds, equipment, fertilizer and livestock, which were killed during the war. The most important step to regaining economic independence, she felt, is to get rid of the Russians for the Communist threat to Austria is very real.

The only way Europe can become, once again, self-sustaining, Dr. Pembauer said, is to either get rid of the Russians which are crippling European economy, or to form an alliance of the states of western Europe so that there could be interchange of products, which there is no now.

"The people of Europe are bound and tied down by tradition and degenerated by a war," Dr. Pembauer concluded. "The Americans have a great vitality and energetic spirit to give to Europe. The democratic spirit there is still alive and it is important to defend it against the communist threat."

Dr. Pembauer, who confessed that she came to America on a one-way ticket, said that she would like to visit relatives in the United States, if possible. She is interested in teaching, and in free-lance writing and likes it very much in the West, which she says, is much like her native Austria, with its green hills and evergreen forests. She arrived in the United States less than two months ago, and is now studying journalism at Pacific university.

### Phoenicia Temple Plans Program

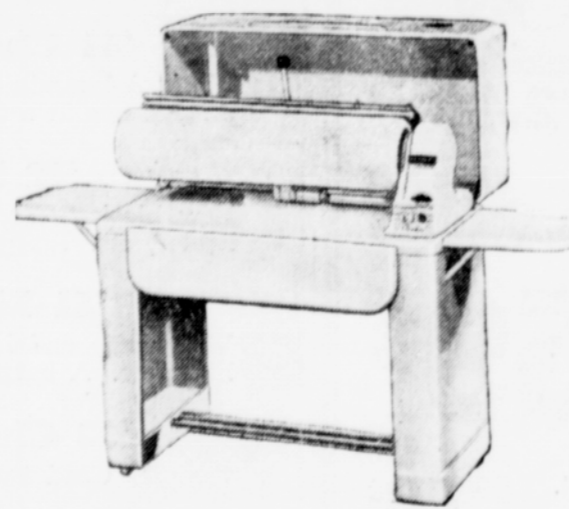
A program honoring Mother's Day will be given at the meeting of Phoenicia temple, Pythian Sisters, Friday night in the K. P. hall at 8 o'clock.
