

"Mobilizing for Peace" Theme of National Meeting

With the convention theme "Mobilizing for Peace" the General Federation of Women's Clubs national convention in Portland, May 24-29, will have as speakers, men and women prominent in national and international affairs for their assemblies, panels, luncheons and dinners.

Mrs. William B. Chandler, Hillsboro, Oregon federation president and convention chairman, announced that the following speakers will participate in the convention.

On Tuesday, May 25, Ray Sorenson, managing director of the YMCA in San Francisco, California, will speak on "Our Country's Progressive Program for Youth". This will be an evening session devoted to youth conservation and his address will be preceded by a panel of state chairmen of youth conservation discussing "How Women's Clubs are Stimulating and Extending Services for Children and Youth."

Wednesday, May 26, will have at the morning session, Dr. Stephen R. L. Penrose, Jr., President-elect, American University of Beirut, Lebanon on "America and the Middle East". At the Wednesday afternoon session an international broadcast will be aired through the Columbia Broadcasting system "Round World—Round Table". The moderator will be Dorothy Lewis, coordinator, women's broadcast, radio division of the United Nations. Participating will be members of the General Federation's executive board headed by Mrs. J. L. Blair Buck, president, and including Mrs. Ambrose N. Dunbar, international relations chairman; Mrs. John L. Whitehurst, chairman, secretary of foreign and territorial clubs and Mrs. Theodora S. Chapman, education chairman.

Following the broadcast Dr. Wilson Compton, president of Washington State college, will speak on "Higher Sights".

Thursday, May 27, at the morning session, Carl Starker, Oregon landscape architect and author of "Western Flower Arrangement" will discuss "Principles of Flower Arrangements". Mrs. John J. Kirk, chairman of the Indian welfare committee on "Tomorrow's American Indians." This will be an important act on a resolution which favors the reform of the U. S. Office of Indian Affairs both as to policy and administration.

On Thursday, May 27, at the afternoon session under the public welfare department of the General Federation, Dr. Richard Risley May, consulting psychologist and lecturer in psychology at Lewis and Clark college has given his topic "Woman's Mind and the New Community".

Thursday evening will pay a salute to the Junior Clubs and will feature a featured speaker, Dr. Philip Cummings, news analyst and commentator on "American Youth Faces the Future." There will be a presentation of noted screen personalities yet to be announced and a world premier of "Melody Time," a Walt Disney feature picture.

For international relations day, Friday, May 28, the afternoon session will hear General Carlos P. Romulo, Ambassador Extraordinary

Plenipotentiary from the Philippines to the United States. This will be followed by a dance pageant, "One World," showing international dances and directed by Ernest Roberts, New York City and executive director of United Nations Friendship, Inc. Friday evening, Eric Johnston, president of the Motion Picture association of America and ex-president of the United States chamber of commerce, will be one of the principal speakers. He will be followed by Dr. T. F. Tsiang, representative of China on the United Nations security council. This session will be open to the public.
