

Lower Income Taxes, Sale Of Liquor by Drink Asked

Glenn Ackerman of Portland, candidate for Republican nomination for governor, last week announced he favored restoration of personal income tax exemption of \$750 for an individual and \$1500 for man and wife and asked for liberalization of the liquor control law to permit the sale of alcoholic liquor by the glass.

He stated he favors liberalizing the laws governing gambling devices to permit legalized and increased control of their sale and use. He would also solve the housing problem confronting World War veterans by providing for payment of a cash bonus to them when they could use as down payment on a house.

Other points in his platform include:

1. Aggressively prosecute commercial exploitation of the natural resources of the state by the institution of a national advertising campaign, designed to make the nation "Oregon conscious."
2. Give practical and sincere encouragement to outside business interests for the location of their industries within the state.
3. Legislate a program insuring progressive development of the expanded opportunities open to the people of the state of Oregon, thereby leading to the betterment of their living conditions.
4. Support a program designed to expand existing farm, business and industrial institutions now located in Oregon.
5. Strive for the expanded support of federal authorities to care for the needs of a greater Oregon.

Withholding Tax Repeal Asked by Senator McKay

State Senator Douglas McKay, Salem, candidate for Republican nomination for governor, last week advocated repeal of the state withholding tax passed by the 1947 legislature. No more burdensome and impractical tax was ever enacted in Oregon, he said.

McKay also advocated amendment of the state income tax law to permit deductions for unusual medical expenses. He also advocated a sugar cake decoration on the top of the cake decorations, I noticed. expense of the family and for life insurance premiums up to \$250 a year to be patterned after the similar federal income tax deduction. The candidate also advocated caution in the use of the present state treasury surplus as he believed the bulk of it should remain as a backlog against an inevitable decline in income tax revenues.

In speaking of the repeal of the state withholding tax, McKay stated it doesn't make sense that complicated tax returns and wage reports should be required to pay a tax of a few cents on a monthly payroll of \$50. He predicted a justified revolt when home owners find out they must make deductions of a few cents and file tax reports with the state tax commission if wages for roof repair and occasional help around the home including baby sitters total \$30 in a month.

McKay pointed out his stand on the withholding tax was another case in which his legislative record was opposed to Governor Hall. When both were in the 1947 legislature, McKay voted against withholding tax while Hall voted for it.

Won't it be wonderful when we can afford to make a living? Silly, isn't it? Can't help it. . . just the way I feel this morning. Here's another . . . it requires a very sharp ear to hear the sound of falling prices! A truer word was never spoken! Don't go away . . . there's lots more to follow. For instance . . . as soon as you get on easy street someone always starts to tear up the pavement . . . but . . . why advertise your troubles? There's no market for them. A little less funny and a little more true . . . remember that people have to put up with you, so be more tolerant of others. Also . . . Check up on yourself when the going gets too easy . . . you may be going down instead of up.

Now that I have all that off my mind, (no remarks, please, I do have a mind!) let's get on to other things.
Mrs. Ona Litchford of route 5, Box 764, Portland, sent in a good looking recipe. She calls it a Compromise Cake.
1 cup raisins
rind of one orange
1/4 cup nuts
1/2 cup shortening
1/2 cup sugar

5/8 cup brown sugar
2 eggs separated
1 cup sour milk
2 cups flour
1 teaspoon soda
1/2 teaspoon salt
Cream shortening, add sugar, beaten egg yolks and orange rind. Sift flour several times with soda and salt. Add flour and milk alternately. Lightly flour raisins and nuts and add to mixture. Stir well. Fold in stiffly beaten egg whites carefully.
Bake at 350 degrees for about 35 minutes. Use a long loaf pan placing brown sugar and coconut on top to cook while cake is baking. Thank you, Mrs. Litchford.
Who doesn't like Devil's Food cake. Here is the recipe used by P. Moreau, Chef of the Hotel St. Regis, New York City. I have used this one many times myself . . . It can't be beat!
1 1/2 cups sugar
1/2 cup butter
2 eggs
3/4 cup sour milk or cream
1 teaspoon baking powder
1 teaspoon soda
2 cups sifted all purpose flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon vanilla
1/2 cup cocoa mixed with 1/2 cup hot water.
Cream butter and sugar. Add beaten eggs. Add flour sifted with baking powder alternately with sour cream in which soda has been dissolved . . . salt, vanilla, and co-
