Stimulates Interest in Oregon: Oregon is continuing to receive valuable attention from national publications for its attractions to tourists.

City Financing Problems

The task faced by the Hillsboro budget committee and council in preparing the budget for the coming year is indicative of the serious finance problems faced by municipalities.

In spite of gains in assessed valuations the six per cent limitation makes it impossible to increase expenditures by more than six per cent over the highest of one of three previous years general fund expenditures.

With finances an ever increasing problem, it is becoming necessary for municipal governments to look more and more for possible new sources or increased sharing of state-collected taxes.

These are just a few instances that show means by which the state government could help ease the overwhelming financial burden suffered by many Oregon communities due to sudden growing pains.—W. M.

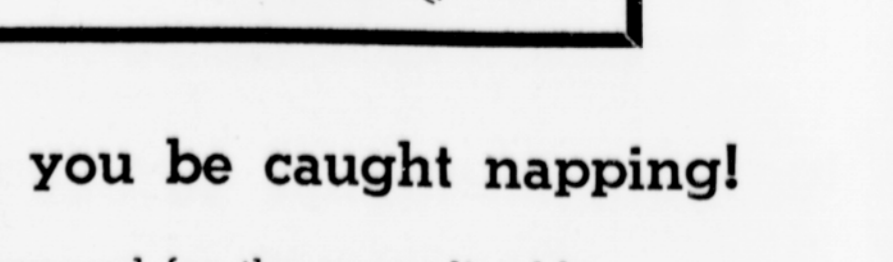
