

RC Field Director Speaks at Chapter Board Meeting

Mrs. Josephine Conrath, field director at Barnes Veterans' administration hospital, Vancouver, Wash., spoke at the Washington County Chapter board meeting the evening of May 13.

She explained that the field director is a liaison between the communities and the hospital, and that the purpose of the field director is to determine what is needed in the hospital.

The Red Cross field directors are in the Veterans' Administration hospitals at the request of General Bradley. There has been a field director at Barnes hospital for a year and a half. American Red Cross and the American Legion Auxiliary are the only organizations who give service on a scheduled basis.

Barnes Veterans' hospital is a general medical and surgical hospital. Of the 300 patients there, one-third are tubercular.

The program carried out through the field director depends on the Red Cross chapters nearby. There is a council made up of Clark county, Wash., Clackamas, Washington and Multnomah counties, and Longview, to channel community services within the hospital. The services include Gray Ladies, arts and crafts, and production supplies such as socks, slippers and sweaters.

At Barnes hospital, the office, storage room and lounge of the field director is furnished with surplus Red Cross supplies.

Washington county has been responsible for five Sunday coffee

hours and two birthday parties at Veterans' Administration hospitals. George unit of Forest Grove, Pacific university, and the Washington county Junior Red Cross have important business and programs.
