Blight Control Measures In Walnut Orchards Urged

Walnut growers should apply the first blight control immediately on grafted fruitlet and mayette orchards located on the valley floor, County Agent Palmer Torvend said Wednesday. Controls for orchards in the foothills may be applied from one to four days later. Torvend recommended the following materials be used: Spray program Bordeaux mixture 4-2-100 14 pounds copper sulfate, 2 pounds quicklime or 2½ pounds hydrated lime, 100 gallons water) is advised for general use. A summer oil emulsion, at the rate of one pint of oil emulsion to every 100 gallons of spray, should be added to the Bordeaux mixture to reduce the severity of leaf injury in the event that conditions favor its development. Yellow cuproside may be used as a substitute for Bordeaux mixture where convenience and freedom from injury are more important considerations than cost. This material should be applied at the rate of one pound in 100 gallons of water. Dust program: A copper plus lime plus sulfur plus oil dust composed

If you already have a pressure cooker, now is the time to check it over. The pressure gauge should be cleaned with a pipe cleaner. See that the indicator rests against the pin and the arrow points to zero. Take a quick peek at what you have left over from last year, check your supply of jars and lids, and you are all ready to go at the first sign of fresh produce.

Mrs. Frank Peterson sent me a recipe for Malted Milk cake which I think sounds especially good.

½ cup shortening
1 cup sugar
2 eggs
½ teaspoon salt
1 square melted chocolate
2 cups cake flour
¼ cup malted milk powder
¼ teaspoon soda
2 teaspoons baking powder
1 cup milk

Blend shortening, sugar, eggs, salt and melted chocolate. Sift dry ingredients and add alternately with milk. Beat until smooth. Bake in two greased 9-in. baking pans at 350 degrees for 30 minutes.

Here is the icing, too. Sift 1 pound powdered sugar with ¼ cup malted milk powder. Combine with ¼ cup butter and ½ teaspoon salt. Add ¼ cup strong coffee and beat until smooth.

Thank you, Mrs. Peterson. I hope that you enjoy the recipe I put in here. They are coming in faster all the time. We should be able to publish a very fine cook book when they are all put together.

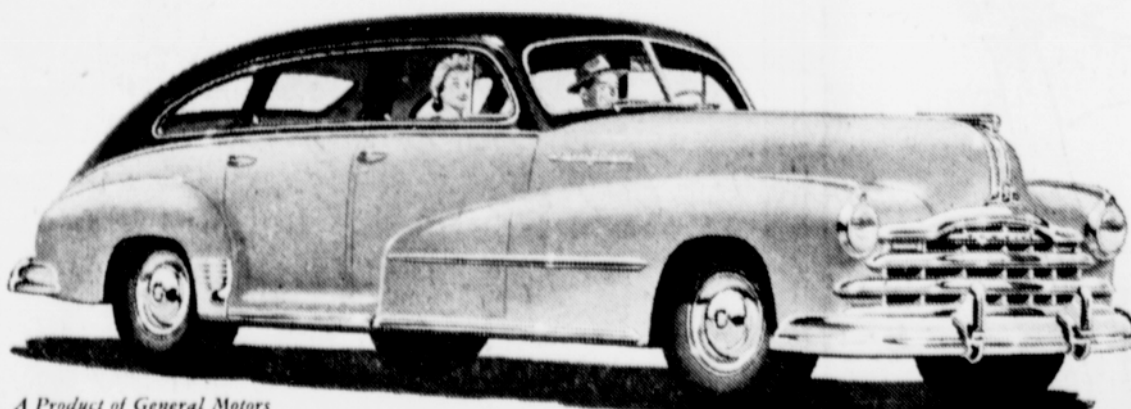
