

Pacific's Boxer To Return Home

Boxer, student-prized Chinese idol of Pacific university, will return to the campus this summer after a mysterious disappearance of more than two years, according to work received by Dr. Giersbach, Pacific president, from Phil Porter, class of '43.

Porter, who is attending the University of Michigan Medical school at Ann Arbor, said his mother, Mrs. Alpha Porter of Hillsboro, had mailed him Boxer after some relatives of hers had found the "dog" in the woods near Hillsboro.

The bronze statue, which is valued at \$1500 by antique dealers, was first presented to Pacific university in 1896 and within a few years was "kidnapped" from the college chapel by students. Since that time it has been a coveted possession and a prize for which Pacific students have battled many times.

Porter wrote he will bring the "dog" back with him when he returns in June.
