Safety Program Backed by Judge

County Judge H. D. Kerkman today pledged his support to a campaign sponsored by Secretary of State Earl T. Newberry and other officials to reduce summertime traffic accidents this year.

Rural areas—open highways—claimed 79 per cent of all traffic fatalities in Oregon last year," Judge Kerkman reported. "This figure has climbed steadily from 61 per cent in 1944 to become the most outstanding and discreditable feature of our accident experience."

Approaching summer season is expected to bring the heaviest highway travel in the state's history, and officials fear an upsurge in traffic deaths unless motorists accept their responsibility for avoiding carelessness and a dangerous driving habit. "Studies prepared by the secretary of state year after year show the overwhelming proportion of accidents involve human failure, not mechanical failure," Judge Kerkman pointed out.

Excessive speed is listed as a dominant cause of highway deaths, closely followed by intoxication, passing in the face of approaching traffic, and walking in the path of vehicles, he said. "As a matter of
