Interested in Pictures

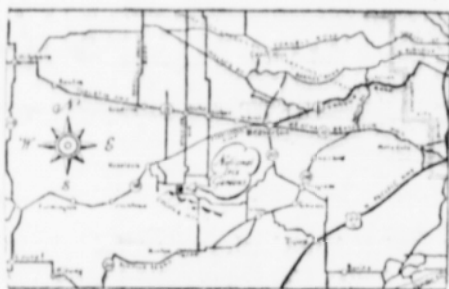
